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flattered to have been given such serious consideration and that although the opportunity was "wonderful," Oregon is where he will remain.

"I have 15 years here at the University and it has been a great experience for me," Moseley said. "In the end, Susan and I talked and we decided to go with our hearts."

As provost, Moseley will become the chief academic officer of the 16,700-student University and will serve as chief executive officer in the absence of the president. He will also allocate funds to academic units and approve faculty appointments, promotions and tenure decisions. His salary as provost has been set at \$115,000 annually.

Moseley was selected from 117 applicants and nominees for the position after a national search that progressed for several months. Moseley and three other finalists visited the University in late April and early May to meet with various groups and make public presentations.

In his speech to the University search committee on May 9, Moseley stressed the importance of the provost and faculty working together as a team to meet the increase in demand for cost-quality education at a time when funds are severely diminishing. This goal was reiterated by Moseley Wednesday as being the number one challenge he will tackle in becoming the new provost.

"This is the problem that the public is asking us to solve but this is just the beginning," Moseley said. "As provost, I will work with all members of the community to meet this challenge."

Moseley also stated that decreasing the amount of time it takes for students to graduate, improving financial aid distribution and increasing technology at the University are goals he will undertake as the University's new provost.

As the University's research vice president since 1985, Moseley has created several interdisciplinary programs, including the Oregon Humanities Center, the Center for Asian and Pacific Studies, the Institute for a Sustainable Environment and the Center for Housing Innovation.

In 1979, Moseley came to Oregon where he directed the Chemical Physics Institute from 1980 to 1984 and served as head of the physics department during 1984-1985. He has worked with other departments at the University to add more than 20 women faculty members in the sciences and to attract minority graduate students. He has published more than 75 research articles in major journals and eight major reviews.

Moseley is a board member for the Oregon Bach Festival and the Southern Willamette Research Corridor. He chairs the University Strategic Plan Committee and plays a key role in the budget planning and oversees external grant support that has grown more than 80 percent since 1986. He also directs federal relations for the institution and assumed administrative responsibility for the University Foundation during 1985-87.

Proceedings to find a replacement to fill Moseley's current position as vice president for research will begin immediately.

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
