mation, he said.

Moseley said universities must change the way that they operate.

"There's too much information out there. We're never going to teach more than a tiny fraction of it," he said. "We need to teach students how to learn and how to get the information and put the information together."

The University also must prepare to teach a greater number of students while improving its quality of education, Moseley said. Improved instructional technology would enable students and teachers to better use their time, he said.

Eventually, Moseley said, increased use of computers in teaching could expand options for students. Students living elsewhere in the state could take a course from the University. Students could take an intensive course in a subject during winter vacation or spring break. They could enroll in a course at the University without needing to attend lectures, Moseley said.

If the state Board of Higher Education allows the University to begin charging students the \$50 fee for fall term, modem lines into the Computing Center would triple for fall term, Moseley said.

A campus network with reserve materials would be established. While the University must work within copyright laws to place reserve materials

on the network, Moseley said he hoped as much as half of library reserve materials would be available by winter term.

As TCI Cablevision wires residence halls for cable television next year, the company also will run fiber optic cable that will link students with computers in the dorms to the campus network.

Faculty members must be trained how to use the network. Moseley said he would like to see faculty develop presentations on a computer, show the presentation in class with computers and overhead projectors, then put the presentation on the campus network.

The University also will need to find people to manage the network, Moseley said. The cost of doing all of this will not fall solely on students, he said.

"There's going to be a whole series of (grant) proposals to the federal government and to private foundations for information technology," Moseley said.

Moseley said the University needs to spend between \$4 million and \$5 million per year to establish itself as a national leader among colleges in instructional technology. Moseley said he hopes the University will raise \$1.5 million per year in private or federal grants and will reallocate money from existing budgets within the University.

Eric Bowen, 1993-94 ASUO president, said, "It's real easy to spend money when you're spending on technology. Fifty

dollars (per student) doesn't buy that much. ... When you're buying hardware and hiring employees to service it, costs get pretty high pretty quick."

Weldon Ihrig, vice chancellor in charge of finance and administration for the Oregon State System of Higher Education, expressed similar concerns.

"To just have another fee doesn't, I think, cut it," Ihrig said. "If we look at a technology fee, we really have to assure students of what we're going to deliver for it."

However, Ihrig said, awareness of technology and demand to learn technology continues to grow among incoming high school students.

"One of the big challenges we have in getting ready for the next generation of high school students is the use of technology in instruction," he said.

"If we don't find some way to move forward in technology, I think students are going to say 'Hey, you're not giving us what we want.'"
