deployment brings the number of U.S. warships in the region to about a dozen, the Pentagon said.

One official who asked not to be identified said that a number of officials in the State Department's Latin America bureau strongly oppose the current policy trend and believe an invasion would be a mistake.

But Clinton's top adviser on Haiti, former Rep. William Gray, said talk of an invasion is premature because he is confident the U.S. policy of economic denial will get the job done.

"We believe that our policies are going to work. Along with the rest of the world community, the U.N., and the Organization of American States, we believe that the dictatorship will step down," Gray said earlier on ABC.

"We don't expect the military regime to be there six months from now...." Gray said. "If they don't (step down), then there are options that are open. The president has made it very clear that the military option is just one of those options."

Asked directly if he was saying "we have to have the military government out in Haiti within six months?" Gray responded:

"That's exactly the message, and it is my belief that that is going to happen."

President Clinton, speaking in Riga, Latvia, was less categorical but said he believes the toughened sanctions in effect since May 21 are having an impact.

Later, State Department deputy spokeswoman Christine Shelly said, "I think there are indications of pressure building up within the country (Haiti)."

The administration has been talking increasingly about the need to protect Americans in Haiti but Senate Minority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., said the biggest danger to Americans in Haiti would be an invasion.

Instead of seeking a political solution, Dole said, the administration "has chosen the unfortunate course of beating the war drums, continuing to search for a public reason to invade Haiti."

Ernest Preeg, a former ambassador to Haiti, agreed with Dole that an attempt at political reconciliation would be the wisest course for the administration.

finally been able to devote enough time to prepare the grant," Allen said. "It's all a matter of putting the time in."

The NEH plans to catalog all the nation's newspapers by the year 2002.

Collections already cataloged are available on the Internet by a nationwide, on-line database produced by the Computer Library Center of Dublin, Ohio, Allen said.

Project staff will include University librarians and a coordinator who has yet to be hired.

An advisory board will oversee the project. Its first meeting will be in October.

Board members will include: Richard Maxwell Brown, the University's Beekman Professor of Northwest and Pacific History, and Stephen E. Ponder, University associate professor of journalism, both of Eugene; Leonard Lanfranco, executive director of the Oregon Newspaper Publishers Association; Chester Orloff, executive director of the Oregon Historical Society; James Scheppeke, state librarian at the University State Library, Salem; and an Oregon Library Association representative yet to be named.
