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Marshals stationed at abortion clinics

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal marshals were stationed Monday outside dozens of abortion clinics around the nation and guarded some abortion doctors in an effort to head off further violence by anti-abortion protesters.

"We're trying to take all prudent steps, using all the federal tools, including the clinic access legislation, to appropriately address an issue of deep concern to this nation," Attorney General Janet Reno said.

Violence at clinics "has now occurred twice in one city," Reno told reporters before meeting law enforcement executives. "It is a problem throughout the nation."

She was referring to the killing in Pensacola, Fla., of Dr. David Gunn as he arrived to work at an abortion clinic in March 1993 and the killing there last Friday of Dr. John B. Britton and his escort, James H. Barrett, as they arrived at another abortion clinic.

Defenders of abortion rights, including two dozen who picketed the Justice Department, renewed pressure Monday for an aggressive federal investigation of links between those three killings and other clinic worker shootings they believe are the work of a conspiracy.

They want Reno to use the Freedom of Access to Clinic Entrances Act of 1994, which makes it a crime to obstruct, intentionally injure or intimidate anyone trying to obtain an abortion. In death cases, it carries a top penalty of life in prison.

Anti-abortion activist Randall Terry, whose "Impeach Clinton" bus pulled up at the Justice Department during the abortion rights picketing, condemned the clinic murder but called it "ludicrous to have marshals out because of two or three murders when there are hundreds of thousands of crack houses."

"Their call for a full federal investigation ... is ... designed to terrorize average Americans in the pro-life movement," Terry said.

Reno refused to say how many clinics and marshals are involved, but a federal law enforcement source, who declined to be identified by name, put the number of protected sites in the dozens.

Senate votes to cut funds for pro-gay schools

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted Monday to cut off federal funds to any school district that teaches acceptance of homosexuality as a lifestyle.

The 63-36 vote on a proposal by Sens. Jesse Helms, R-N.C., and Sen. Bob Smith, R-N.H., came during debate on reauthorization of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, which provides \$12.5 billion in federal funds to the nation's public schools.

Smith said school districts use the money to buy books and other materials that are "so graphic and so disgusting that I can't display them here on the floor of the United States Senate."

But Sen. Paul Wellstone, D-Minn., said the provision would forbid counseling of gay students, who he said are up to three times as likely to commit suicide as other teen-agers.

"We simply can't do that," he said, calling the amendment "very mean-spirited."

The measure would cut federal aid to districts that "carry out a program or activity that has either the purpose or effect of encouraging or supporting homosexuality as a positive lifestyle alternative."

It includes distribution of instructional materials, counseling and referral of students to gay organizations.

The House included a similar

amendment when it passed the bill. Differences between the two versions will have to be worked out by a conference committee before the bill can be signed into law by President Clinton.

Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., chairman of the Senate Labor and Human Resources Committee, said the proposal would inject the federal government into local decision-making, and would "remove the local discretion that is the hallmark of our educational system."

Some school districts teach acceptance of homosexuality during social studies or sex education programs.

A controversial program in

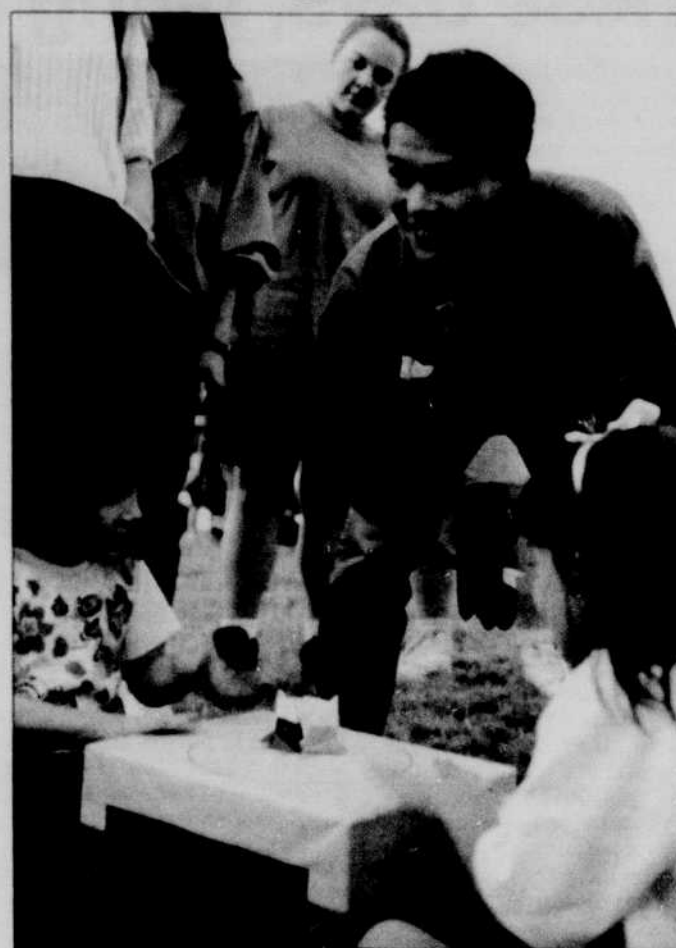
New York City led to the ouster of Joseph Fernandez as chancellor of the nation's largest school system last year.

Some school programs use books such as "Heather Has Two Mommies" and "Daddy's Roommate," that depict lesbian and gay couples in family settings with children.

Other books, used in HIV-AIDS education programs, are more graphic, describing sexual acts and advocating the use of latex condoms during intercourse.

Helms denounced what he called the "disgusting, obscene material that's laid out before school children in this country every day."

Citadel may shave cadet's head

CHARLESTON, S.C. (AP) — The Citadel may shave Shannon Faulkner's head when she becomes the first woman to join the school's corps of cadets, a judge said Monday.

U.S. District Judge C. Weston Houck also ordered Faulkner to stay in a private room in the college's infirmary instead of its barracks. And he rejected her request for a sexual harassment committee to monitor her progress in the corps.

Faulkner's attorneys argued that she should not be subjected to the humiliation of having her head shaved.

"I'm not talking about anything right now," Faulkner said after the almost 3½-hour hearing. Her attorneys also declined to comment.

Houck ruled last month the Citadel's all-male admissions policy is unconstitutional and ordered Faulkner into the corps this fall. The state military school is appealing.

Monday's hearing was to resolve differences in plans for housing Faulkner.

The college proposed giving her a closecropped haircut like other freshmen. Faulkner's attorneys wanted a short bob like that given to women at the

service academies.

Attorney Val Vojdik said shaving a woman's head is humiliating, noting the French did it to women who collaborated with Nazis in World War II.

"I don't think any woman should be forced to undergo public humiliation to get a public education in this state," said Vojdik as she produced a picture of a shaved French woman being taunted by a crowd.

But Houck said the law acknowledges no difference between men and women in the way they wear their hair.

"The Citadel is at liberty and justified within its rights to shave her head," he ruled.

School attorney Dawes Cooke said the college could have saved itself a public relations headache by not insisting on the haircut. But he said it's an important part of the cadet experience.

"What it means is a symbolic relinquishing of individuality," he said. "Many cadets describe it as the most humiliating moment of their lives. For us to say to Ms. Faulkner that she be treated differently would hurt her chances for assimilation into the corps."

ed it with a \$500 capital investment.

Mother Kali's, a member of the Feminist Bookstore Network, has developed a special relationship with small, women-oriented presses. Harbaugh said this characteristic is one of the things that allows the bookstore to stand out from mainstream book sellers.

"We're dedicated to recovering works, lost or overlooked," Harbaugh said. "We have the best selection of books by women of color in the Northwest. Our lesbian section is more extensive than any of the other stores in the area."

The fact that Mother Kali's is now the third bookstore on 13th Avenue doesn't bother Harbaugh. "We want to be there for people who are curious about us and we want to be available as a resource," she said.

"We refer people to other stores and community organizations all the time — that's good business. Each of the stores has some overlap, but it's not an adversarial relationship," Harbaugh said.

Harbaugh borrowed a thought from the poet Audre Lorde to describe what Mother Kali's wants to maintain and carry on in this area: "To use our strength in the service of our vision."
