Stewart bomb stuns Michigan

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) - Four years ago, Colorado won a game on a freak play as time expired and went on to win the national championship. Will it happen again in 1994?

It could. After beating Michigan 27-26 Saturday on Kordell Stewart's 64-yard touchdown pass to Michael Westbrook on the final play, Colorado moved into position to challenge for another title.

The Buffaloes (3-0) rose two spots to No. 5 in The Associated Press poll after pulling off the most spectacular Hail Mary pass since Doug Flutie's 1984 miracle in Miami.

"It puts us in a position to win a national title. but there's a long way to go," Colorado coach Bill McCartney said.

In 1990, the Buffaloes beat Missouri 33-31 on a fifth-down TD run that occurred because the officials lost track of the downs. Colorado also needed a little luck to beat Michigan, although Stewart and Westbrook displayed tremendous talent on the last play.

Stewart's pass sailed more than 70 yards in the air, and Westbrook made a diving catch in the end zone after the ball was touched by two other players.

"Kordell's ability to scramble around and then throw it that far made the play possible," McCartney said. "Westbrook's job on that play is to position himself to make a catch on a rebound, which he did.

The play, which is certain to become a highlight film classic like Flutie's pass to Gerard Phelan and California's five-lateral kickoff return against Stanford in 1982, turned Stewart into a serious Heisman Trophy contender.

Stewart, the nation's third-rated passer, showed his versatility against Michigan. He passed for 294 yards and two touchdowns, ran for 85 yards, and set Colorado career records for TD passes and total offense

But he'll be remembered for that one play when he dropped back, waited patiently and heaved the ball as far as he could. So how would Stewart compare his pass to Flutie's fling a decade earlier?

"That was one of the best plays in college football, but I think this one was better because we did it." Stewart said.

Teammate Darius Holland felt it was a case of divine intervention

"Those guys out there asked for a miracle and God decided to give it to them," he said.

After beating Big Ten powers Wisconsin and Michigan on consecutive weeks, Colorado could use a breather. But the Buffaloes won't get one with their rugged schedule, which includes four ranked opponents in the next five weeks.

Colorado visits No. 16 Texas on Saturday, then plays Missouri before facing No. 21 Oklahoma, No. 23 Kansas State and No. 2 Nebraska.

Michigan, meanwhile, must quickly recover from one of its most stunning losses. The Wolverines (2-1), who dropped three places to No. 7 in this week's poll, open their Big Ten season at Iowa on Saturday.

"We have to rebound, go back to work on the fundamentals," said coach Gary Moeller, whose team blew a 12-point lead in the last 2:16. "You've got to keep your head up. Our most important games are still to come."

Trojans vent anger on Baylor 37-27

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Southern Cal had to wait two weeks to vent its anger following a drubbing at Penn State. Previously unbeaten Baylor felt the wrath of the Trojans on Saturday night.

Shawn Walters gained a career-high 207 yards on 31 carries and scored three touchdowns and Rob Johnson completed 27-of-39 passes for 364 yards and one TD as the 19thranked Trojans beat the Bears 37-27

Southern Cal (2-1) was playing for the first time since being beaten 38-14 by No. 5 Penn State

Baylor (3-1) was facing a ranked team for the first time this year. Its victories came over Louisiana Tech, San Jose State and Oklahoma State

Although they rolled up 583 yards, the Trojans led by only seven points until Cole Ford kicked his third field goal of the game, a 26-yarder with 10:26 remaining. Jeff Kopp's first career inter-

ception and 41-yard return to

the Baylor 22 set up the kick.

Israel Ifeanyi intercepted another pass by Jeff Watson less than a minute later, setting up a 1-yard run by Walters with 5:32 left that made it 37-20. A 7-yard run by Watson with 1:56 remaining completed the scoring

Both offenses were unstoppable in the first period.

Clifton Rubin capped an 80yard, six-play drive following the opening kickoff with a 1yard run to give Baylor a 7-0 lead

The Trojans responded immediately, moving 76 yards in nine plays. Walters capped the drive with a 7-yard run.

After a 43-yard kickoff return by Anthony Hodge, the Bears moved into position for a 25yard field goal by Jarvis Van Dyke.

The Trojans then moved 74 yards on just five plays, scoring on a 14-yard pass from Johnson to Ken Grace, making it 14-10 with 30 seconds still left in the opening period.

Baylor did very little offensively after that, but remained in the game thanks to a 98-yard kickoff return by Ben Bronson in the third quarter and several blown scoring opportunities by the Trojans.

Southern Cal extended its lead to 21-10 on a 39-yard run by Walters with 1:08 left before halftime, capping a 48-yard, three-play drive.

Van Dyke's 45-yard field goal with 3 seconds left in the half cut Southern Cal's lead to 21-13.

Ford kicked field goals of 25 and 34 yards in the third period, but Bronson made his long return after the first one.

A Baylor player hadn't returned a kickoff for a touchdown since Bruce Davis's 99yard return against SMU in 1983

Watson completed both of his passes for 58 yards and had a 23-yard run on Baylor's first possession, but wound up the game with 14 completions in 33 attempts for 241 yards with the two fourth-quarter interceptions.
