"People call things censorship that really aren't censorship in the strict sense. It may just be restricting access or limiting access. I wouldn't call this censorship unless they took a piece down."

At the conclusion of the discussion, Spickerman announced that the Cultural Forum has scheduled performance artist Karen Finely perform, who made national headlines several years when the National Endowment for the Arts revoked her grant for appearing nude and covered in chocolate.

UNILATERAL CONTROL

The curtains seemed to concern the panelists less than Miller's unilateral ability to impinge on the Cultural Forum's activity.

"This gets down to programs more than censorship in the arts in a lot of ways," Spickerman said. "Who makes the decisions? Does it go through the EMU Board? Does it go through me?"

"The big issue we're all hung up on is who is to be the arbiter of what is morally right and what isn't. It seems anyone who wants to set up a forum to show art in should be allowed to set those criteria," said Sylvia Beres, a local artist who sat in the audience.

"This statement is poorly placed in a hallway on the way to the bathroom where children might see it," Beres said. "If you want to hang the art in your house, in your front lawn, then fine. You be the arbiter."

"This exhibit was about getting in peoples faces. Well, it's gotten in peoples faces and it's no wonder we're reacting to it," said University law professor David Schuman, who sat on the panel.

Schuman explained that the exhibit, if left uncovered, would expose the University to "only a very slight" chance of losing a law suit or being found guilty of breaking state obscenity laws. He addressed the allegation made by

Marlene Drescher, director of the University's Office of Student Advocacy, that Miller had acted on "incompetent" legal advice from law professor Peter Swan.

"If your job is to protect the [University], then that's the advice you give, and you don't give your best guess as to how the case will be resolved," Schuman said. He explained that defending against a legal challenge, such as a law suit to remove the exhibit, could be so expensive as to merit Miller's action.

While the eight-foot-tall black curtains obscured the "See No Evil" exhibit, several new-student orientations took place in the vicinity of the EMU art

gallery, some of which included students' families.

"I felt that this was a decision that had to be made quickly, rather than being challenged and having to remove some of the art," Miller said.

"Whether this show goes up or not should not be based on whether the artist does or does not have a right to exhibit," Schuman told the audience, "and the decision whether the curtains should go up or not go up should not be based on whether the University has a right to put them up or not. The people involved should come together and decide what's appropriate to be seen."
