Dumas pays dividends for WSU

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Washington State coach Mike Price took a chance when he signed Jay Dumas. Now, the junior wide receiver is returning the favor.

Dumas had committed to Boise State University when he got no offers from Pac-10 schools. But at the last minute, Price and his staff decided to sign him, despite concerns about his maturity. There also were questions about his concentration and speed.

"I was thrilled when WSU offered me a scholarship," Dumas said. "I knew I could play at the Pac-10 level. I just needed a chance."

It didn't hurt that Dumas attended Tacoma's Curtis High School, which produced former Cougar receivers C.J. Davis, Deron Pointer and current defensive backs Singor Mobley and Torey Hunter.

"The Curtis connection has been good to us," Price said. "All of those kids have contributed to our success. I think that played a part in Jay's recruitment."

Dumas is following the successful example set by his predecessors from Curtis.

Against Tennessee last weekend, the 6-foot-1, 180-pound junior caught four passes for 60 yards, and he leads Cougars

receivers with 15 catches for 184 yards and a touchdown this season.

"Jay is one of the most exciting players in our conference," Price said recently. "He is a big-play guy, someone who always seems to make something happen when he touches the ball."

"Jay hasn't received a lot of attention, but he will," Price said. "I think he's going to have a great college career at Washington State. He's going to improve as our offense improves."

Dumas has a laid-back personality, Price agreed — until he gets on the field.

"I always hear about these guys

from California who run 4.4s," Price said. "But when they get here, they all seem to run 4.6s. Jay's speed is not a problem."

Dumas, who also returns punts for the Cougars, said he is uncomfortable with the "go-to guy" designation, but quarterback Chad Davis isn't.

"Jay is the guy we look for when we need a big play," Davis said. "He's the type of receiver who can take a 5-yard pass and turn it into a 70-yard touchdown."

"I want our coaches to know that I can make plays in key situations and when the game is on the line," Dumas said.

Huskies take it easy against Spartans

SEATTLE (AP) — After opening their season against Southern Cal, Ohio State, Miami and UCLA, the Washington Huskies are at the easy part of their schedule.

The 12th-ranked Huskies (3-1) are prohibitive favorites against San Jose State (1-4), which has surrendered an average of 46.6 points in its first five games.

Washington defeated UCLA 37-10 at Husky Stadium last Saturday, while San Jose State was shut out by California 55-0.

The Spartans were in Seattle last season, too. The Huskies won that game 52-17.

"San Jose State is a team that's struggling," Washington coach Jim Lambright said. "I hope it's nice to have a week like this, but it scares you, it really does. When you play a game like this, coaches worry about their players' attitudes."

"Washington has all the ingredients to be the number one team in the country," Spartans coach John Ralston said.

Washington's Napoleon Kaufman rushed for a career-high 227 yards in the UCLA game, giving him 670 for the season and 3,321 for his career. He was the Pacific-10 Conference's offensive player of the week.

Kaufman is 493 yards from the Top 50 list of all-time NCAA career rushers. His average of 5.78 yards a carry is better than all but seven on that roster.

The Huskies are campaigning strongly for Kaufman to win the Heisman Trophy but he's playing with a bruised right shoulder. So Lambright may choose not to pad Kaufman's statistics against the Spartans and let him rest in the second half.

Despite playing in pain, Kaufman carried the ball a career-high 34 times against the Bruins.

"Napoleon's stats are real important, but we're not out to get him stats so much as we're out to beat opponents," Lambright said. "So what you hope is that he understands that he's an important part of your machine, but that he's just one of the parts."

After San Jose State, the Huskies will face six Pac-10 opponents to end their second and final season of being banned from a bowl game for NCAA rules violations.

Washington's last six opponents, in order: Arizona State, Oregon, Oregon State, Stanford, California and Washington State. The Huskies are expected to be favored in all six of those games.

The Huskies are hoping to win their last

nine in a row to finish 10-1, a major improvement over their 7-4 record last season. They have a three-game winning streak that includes a victory in Miami that ended the Hurricanes' NCAA-record 58-game Orange Bowl winning streak.

Washington's offense showed a lot of diversity in the UCLA victory with Damon Huard completing 10 of 21 passes for 159 yards and two touchdowns to Dave Janoski. Eric Bjornson had a personal-best five catches for 89 yards.

Free safety Lawyer Milloy is Washington's leading tackler with 45 tackles and linebacker Richie Chambers has 6 sacks.

Both San Jose State's offense and defense are floundering.

The Spartans allowed 523 yards against Cal, the third time they have allowed more than 500 yards in a game this season. San Jose State gained a season-low 147 yards in the Cal loss, punting a season-high 10 times.

San Jose State has rushed for only 319 yards in five games, an average of 1.9 yards per carry. Quarterback Alli Abrew has been intercepted eight times and the Spartans have lost seven games.

San Jose State's quarterbacks have been sacked 22 times.
