Upset: Win over rival Washington puts Oregon in the Rose Bowl race

Oregon's victory over ninth-ranked Washington will go down in Duck annals for two reasons — the drive and the interception.

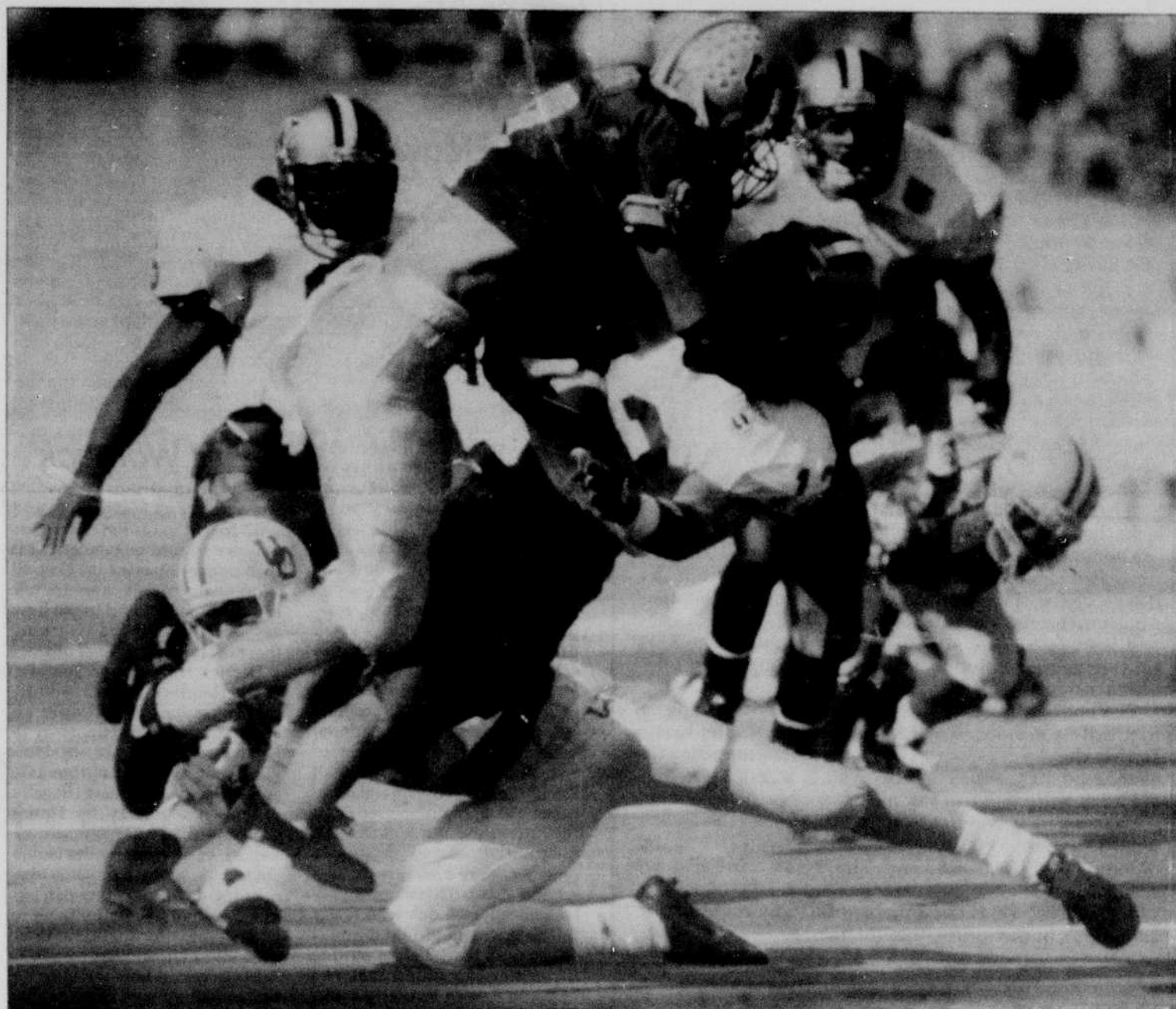
Oregon quarterback Danny O'Neil and cornerback Kenny Wheaton displayed championship composure with their backs to the wall in Saturday's game of emotional ebbs and flows.

The Ducks (5-3 overall, 3-1 conference) rode the leadership of O'Neil and the big-play ability of Wheaton on their way to a 31-20 upset of the Huskies before 44,134 stunned fans in Autzen Stadium and thousands more who watched the nationally televised contest.

"It's a shame for anybody to lose that football game," Oregon head coach Rich Brooks said. "That was two football teams out there slugging it out like it was a championship heavy-weight fight. We certainly kept the fans in the stands and kept it exciting until the last tick of the clock."

"It was a game of opportunities and us taking advantage of the opportunities that we had," Brooks said. "The good news is we've got Arizona coming in and they're the only undefeated team (in the Pacific-10 conference). We're 3-1 and we have a chance to go to 4-1 and really make it interesting."

Washington (5-2, 2-2) struck the first blow with a 38-yard field goal in the second quarter,

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Car crash claims student's life

Death: International student, Toshiya Ikegami, died Saturday of an alcohol-related accident

A University student was killed and another injured in a car accident early Saturday morning.

Toshiya Ikegami, 22, died Saturday morning of injuries sustained from the collision. Ikegami, who was driving the car at the time of the accident, was not wearing a seat belt according to the Lane County Sheriff's Office.

The passenger, Oki Kudo, also a University student, was treated and released

at Sacred Heart Hospital for slight head and leg injuries. Kudo was wearing a seat belt.

Both Ikegami and Kudo had been drinking before the collision, according to a statement Kudo gave to the Sheriff's Office. The amount of alcohol that Kudo and Ikegami consumed Saturday morning is unknown. However, officials have not yet classified the incident as a DUI. The investigation into the accident is continuing.

Several beer cans were found at the scene of the accident, according to a firefighter with the Goshen Fire Department. The source would not speculate as to whether the beer cans in the car

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Task force creates vision of card that does it all

Features: A new I.D. will allow students to utilize many services

It's more than just a photo identification. It's a debit card. It's a key. It's a bus pass. It's the University's new plan to integrate services onto one piece of plastic.

The One Card Task Force, active since last spring, has set up a four-phase process to rev-

olutionize the identification we carry in our back pocket.

Each of the phases adds new, more futuristic features, such as paying for photocopies with the swipe of the card or accessing personal academic information through ATM-like machines on campus.

But everything is a vision right now. The task force is still in the planning stages.

Phase one is an effort to combine eight separate identification cards currently on campus

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
