It wasn't the best of beginnings. With Oregon trailing 20-17 with 7:40 remaining in the game, Danny O'Neil and the Duck offense were tagged with the burden of moving the ball 98 yards from their own two-yard line against a Washington defense that had held the Ducks to a little over 100 yards of total offense well into the fourth quarter.

"I didn't even think about where the ball was," tailback Ricky Whittle said. "Danny just got in the huddle, just looked us straight in the eye and said 'Hey, we got to do it.'"

Before anybody could sit and ponder how the Ducks had squandered so many similar situations like this on the day, as well as in the past, O'Neil hit a wide-open Dameron Ricketts for 36 yards and, more importantly, gave the Ducks some breathing room.

"We were backed up like we had been most of the day," Oregon head coach Rich Brooks said, "but we decided on first down to come out throwing. We needed a big play to get us out of the hole."

Washington head coach Jim Lambright credited the Ducks for coming up with a big play when they needed it most.

"That first one to take them out from the two-yard line to about the 38 was just a mammoth play," Washington head coach Jim Lambright said. "It was just a huge swing in momentum and field position."

Despite the big play, the Ducks continued to have their problems running the ball. Philyaw carried for three yards the next play, and Whittle lost a yard on the ensuing play, setting up a third-and-eight.

But when that team has one of the most dangerous offensive weapons and doesn't even let him touch the ball on the most important drive of the season, the second-guessing begins to make sense.

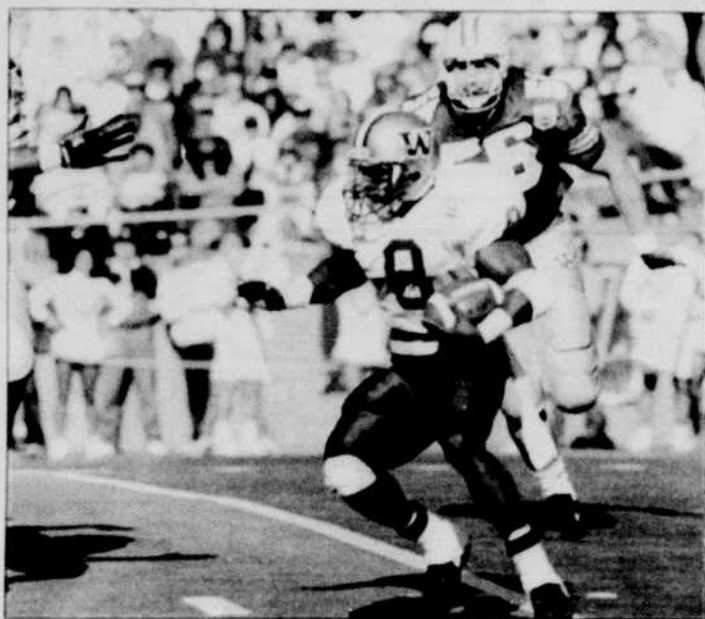
Washington head coach Jim Lambright stood by his choice to pass the ball and minimize
