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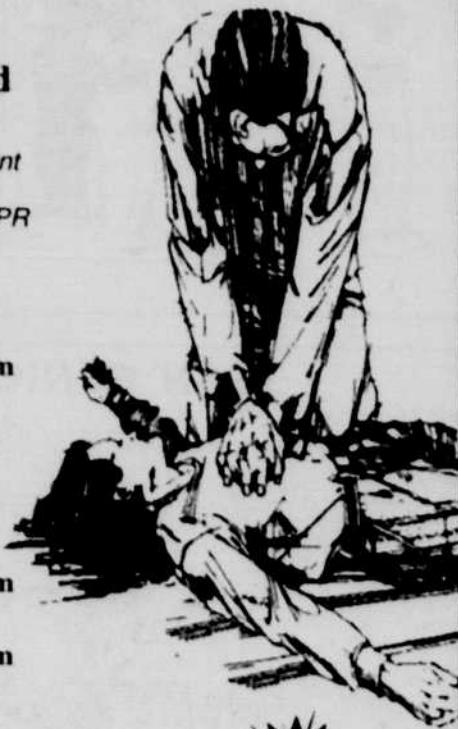

Oregon spikers travel to Bay area

Oregon, 6-14 overall and 0-11 in Pacific-10 play, attempts to end its 13-match losing skid when it takes to the court this weekend.

The University volleyball team invades the top-ranked team in the country, undefeated Stanford, on Friday night and looks to seek revenge against California on Saturday night.

ABOUT OPPONENTS — Stanford (18-0,10-0) appears to be unstoppable. The Cardinal, ranked No. 1 all season, not only have numerous weapons and depth but are very young and should only get better. Stanford has been overpowering and has lost only four games all year. California (3-14, 1-9) has struggled this season and claimed its one conference win in an upset of the Ducks on Sept. 30. The Bears are ninth in the league in blocks and last in hitting percentage.

VS. OPPONENTS — Oregon trails the rivalry with the Cardinal, 19-2, having won in 1989 at Stanford and in 1986 at home. Stanford has taken the past 10 meetings. The Ducks have fared better in the series with California, trailing 23-9, but the Golden Bears have won six straight encounters. Oregon's last victory was a four-game set in Eugene in 1991. Oregon coach Gerry Gregory is 2-17 against Stanford and its coach Don Shaw. He owns a 6-17 mark against California and is 4-9 versus its coach Dave DeGroot.

INJURY REPORT — Sophomore swing hitter Amy McNeel will be out for the season with torn ligaments in her left ankle. She was one of the team leaders in kills, digs, aces and blocks and was a two-year starter. Redshirt freshman quick hitter Dani Cordova made her return last weekend after being out three weeks with a sprained left ankle. Cor-

dova added a spark the Ducks had been lacking during the losing streak. Senior co-captain LaReina Woods had a throat infection that sidelined her Friday night, but she responded with a team-high seven kills against Washington the following night.

PROBABLE STARTERS — Casey Crisler or Anna Gomez will open at setter and will be joined by Angee Henderson opposite the setter. Bettina Roth and Tia Stewart will be the quick hitters, and opening as swing hitters will be LaReina Woods and Alison Pepe.

STAT LEADERS — Henderson leads the team in kills (3.64) and hitting percentage (.243). Roth paves the way for the Ducks in blocks (1.10) and aces (.27). Woods is tops in digs (3.97), and Crisler is the team leader in assists (6.84). Oregon is ranked ninth nationally in team digs (19.37), led by Woods' 19th ranking among individuals.

gether at the NCAA's January convention in San Diego.

Commission members also agreed to support the limited use of "partial qualifiers," the term used for student-athletes who meet the grade point and core curriculum requirements, but fail to score at least 700 on the SAT.

Such students could receive financial aid, which

would count against grant-in-aid ceilings, but would not be allowed to compete during their freshman year and would be limited to just three years of eligibility.

"We thought we were out of business for good," said Creed Black, president of the Knight Foundation, which is underwriting the commission's work. "Then one of the NCAA's member institutions came along and actually made a serious proposal to lower the required SAT score to 410, so we decided to respond to that."
