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GANG

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could prove to be the thorn in the Ducks' side, as the Cougars need only to win their remaining games and rely on another Arizona loss to gain their first Rose Bowl appearance since 1931.

In the upset over Arizona, the Ducks overcame a disappointing first half filled with bad field position and even worse breaks.

But the second half proved to be a different story as Gang Green took control of the game and Danny O'Neil provided just enough offense to lift the Ducks into the thick of the Rose Bowl

race and a national ranking.

Brooks knew that if the Ducks could just cut down on their mistakes and get some sort of offense going that they would be right where they needed to be to win the game behind the strength of the defense.

"We made enough mistakes in the first half to put ourselves in a tough spot, which we were at half time," Brooks said. "I told them that we had 30 minutes to overcome the bad breaks and that we would overcome them."

Oregon's defense held the Arizona running attack to 8 yards in the second half and tightened up coverage on Arizona's receivers, after quarterback Dan White threw for 104 yards in the first half. White often utilized the talents of receiver Richard Dice.

"In the first half we played cautious," said defensive coordinator Nick Aliotti about his secondary's play. "We didn't play very aggressively."

Brooks knew Dice was going to be a match-up problem going into the game and credits the Oregon secondary for making the necessary adjustments on the big receiver.

"I just think that outstanding players are going to make plays once in a while," Brooks said, "and Dice made some plays but so did [our secondary]."

Dice and the other Wildcat receivers proved to be a problem in the first half, but the Duck secondary came up big as the defense held Arizona to 31 yards through the air after half-time.

Statistically, Arizona dominated the first half. The 'Cats held a nine-minute advantage in time of possession and nearly doubled Oregon's offensive output, holding the Ducks to 18 yards rushing on 13 carries.

Forgotten in the aftermath of the Ducks' second-straight victory over a ranked opponent is the fact that O'Neil once again led the Ducks from behind after being heavily criticized for his inability to do so in the past. O'Neil stepped up his play and

minutes into the fourth quarter he pieced together a 53-yard drive. It saw O'Neil and receiver Pat Johnson hook up on two third-and-long situations and an incompletion on fourth down deep in Arizona territory, which resulted in a pass interference call.

Brooks praised O'Neil and his young receivers for their play on Saturday and thinks the Oregon passing game is coming along behind the quarterback's recent play.

"He's doing it with some inexperienced receivers, who now he's becoming a little more accustomed to," Brooks said. "He's been able to practice with them for several weeks now, and I think the timing and confidence is coming back in our passing game."

Oregon was backed up time and time again in its own end the first half, with its average starting field position being its own 24-yard line. But thanks to an even stronger defensive effort that stifled the Wildcats in the second half, the Ducks average starting position was their own 38. The Ducks also held the ball for over 16 minutes in the half as the offense did what it needed to do to keep drives going.

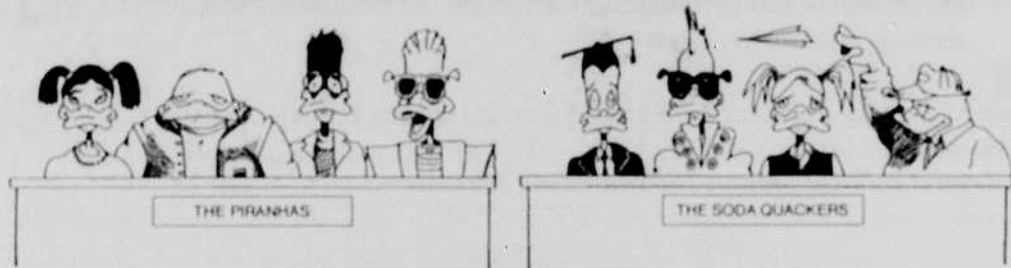
The irony of the latest Duck victory is sweet for Oregon and its players. This group of Ducks was given little or no chance of being in the position to compete for the Rose Bowl. The players and coaches are by no means overconfident about their key victories in recent weeks and have remained down to earth heading into next week's homecoming match up with the Sun Devils.

"It just puts the pressure on next week is all it does," said Oregon tackle Steve Hardin. "We survived another hurdle, and now everybody's going to be waiting for us to stumble."

An excited Aliotti put the situation in perspective.

"I get to savor this probably over dinner and maybe a couple of Cokes and some cookies," he said. "But other than that, we've got to start all over again."

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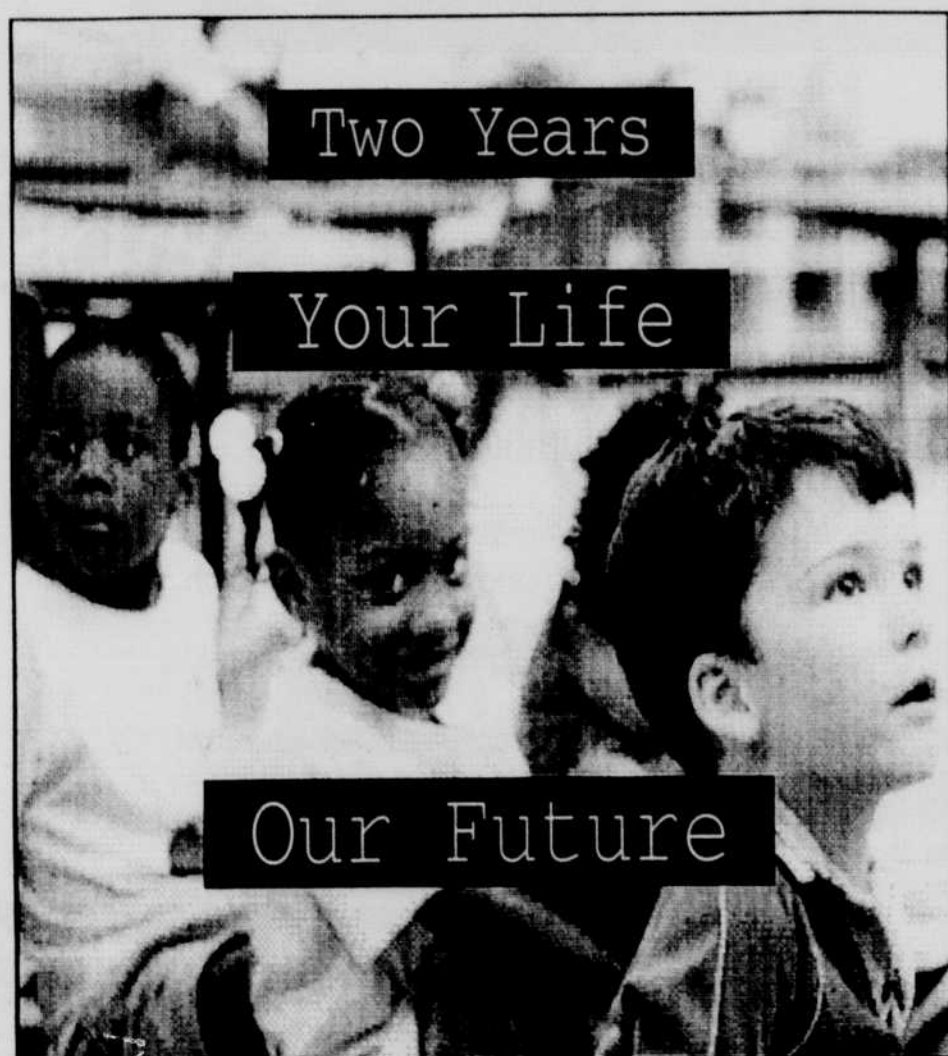
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
