ed. Two years ago, University Physical Plant crews began refitting the structure to provide an outside entrance to the basement. Additionally, the Physical Plant upgraded the heating and ventilation system and did some electrical work.

Before the project is completed, University architect Garry Fritz expects the Faculty Club will spend another \$25,000 finishing the basement's interior and refinishing an antique bar and a bar back the Faculty Club bought for Collier House.

This bar and bar back was removed from Max's Tavern when former owner and University golf coach Steve Nosler quit the tavern business in 1989.

The Faculty Club is independent of the University. It became a corporation in the 1920s. Since 1941, by agreement with the University, the Faculty Club has used the Collier House building.

The costs of the interior refinishing and equipment for the bar will be paid for by the Faculty Club. Because the University owns the building, major renovations to the structure have been paid for out of Physical Plant funds.

To pay for its share of the renovations, the Faculty Club will need to take a loan from the University. University Vice President Dan Williams approved the loan two years ago, saying that the University should and would do anything it could to aid the Faculty Club with this project.

"We were still reeling from Measure 5 and I felt if they could make something like that happen we should help," Williams said.

The University received two bids for refinishing the Collier House basement on Nov. 3, but no other details have been released. The final amount of the loan isn't certain, but the University is giving the loan to the Faculty Club at cost, or what the amount would have earned in interest in the bank.

Renovations to Collier House in the past have been done completely with private funds, but this project is different. To a large extent the University is footing the bill to make a pub in the basement of Collier House a possibility and to boost business for the Faculty Club.

The LEarn and Earn program funds also will be available for need-based students who did not receive a federal work-study position because University funds ran short.

"This is a compromise that we had to give into to get this proposal done," Warren said of the need-based LEarn and Earn funds.

Ed Vignoul, director of the Office of Student Financial Aid, said, "We offered work study for everybody who was eligible in the first process (before March 1), and after that everything was gone."

Vignoul said the program will create between 350 and 400 jobs for these need-based students this year. It will work similar to the federal work-study program but will pay for only 50 percent of a student's wages. The other half must be matched by the department. Under the federal work-


study program, 75 percent is paid by the federal program and the remainder is financed by the department.

All LEarn and Earn jobs will be financed 50 percent by the money from the student technology fee and 50 percent by the department.

The committee has allocated an assigned quota to each of the academic departments on campus. Additional monies were given to the library and computer labs for student employment. Money also is left for nonacademic departments, such as the EMU or Oregon Hall, under the program.

"We are creating learning opportunities for students in ways we have not been able to do before," said Larry Smith, director of the Career Center.

The committee will review 16 proposals for job positions this week. He said work-study positions will be posted in the Career Center by Monday. Postings will continue throughout the year.
