

Remaining conference bowl bids still to be decided

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Here's how the decision will be made on which bowl game the Washington State Cougars will play in this year:

There are two possibilities. Either they will be invited to the Dec. 27 Freedom Bowl in Anaheim, Calif., or the Dec. 31 Alamo Bowl in San Antonio.

Both bowls need to have a Pacific-10 team. But the decisions won't be made until the bowls coalition, which operates the top-ranked bowls in the nation, makes its choices on Saturday or later.

One half of the Freedom Bowl already has been decided. Utah, the Western Athletic Conference runner-up, was chosen Sunday to play in the Dec. 27 event.

The other Freedom Bowl spot goes to the Pac-10 third-

place team. Arizona (7-3, 5-2) and Washington State (7-4, 5-3) are possible representatives.

Arizona plays Arizona State on Friday and could tie USC (6-2, 7-3) for second place in the Pac-10. The bowls coalition then gets a choice of teams to fill slots in the top-rated bowls, before the lower-rated Freedom Bowl selects.

If the coalition picks USC, Arizona would be invited to the Freedom Bowl with a win over Arizona State. Then the Cougars would go to the Alamo Bowl. This is considered the most likely scenario.

If Arizona wins and the coalition selects the Wildcats, the Freedom Bowl would select Washington State, said Don Andersen, director of the Orange County Sports

Association.

USC will not return to the Freedom Bowl for a third consecutive year by mutual agreement.

One last scenario is considered a long shot. The bowls coalition could choose two Pac-10 teams rather than one. If USC were to defeat Notre Dame decisively and Arizona were to beat Arizona State, the coalition might choose both USC and Arizona, leaving Washington State to go to the Freedom Bowl.

If the Cougars go to the Alamo Bowl, potential opponents include two unranked teams, Texas or Baylor.

The Cougars haven't gone to all that many bowl games, so any choice will be a thrill. In 1972, they defeated Utah 31-28 in the Copper Bowl in Tucson, Ariz.

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secutively. The Beavers pinned the Ducks back on their own 16-yard line with a 39-yard punt by Doug Stuckey.

The Ducks were unable to move the ball forward as the Beaver defense sacked O'Neil for a loss of six and kept the running game in check. On fourth-and-17, Belden had to punt from his own end zone. Oregon State's Larry Bumpus came around the outside to block the punt attempt inside the end zone. As the rush was on for the loose ball, Oregon State's Sylvester Green fell on top of it for the Beavers' first score with 12:29 remaining in the half.

Prior to the half coming to a close, the Ducks were able to add three points to their score on a higher-percentage field goal attempt from 34 yards out by Belden.

After the Ducks had been unsuccessful on a fourth-and-two attempt from the Beavers' 33-yard line early in the second half, Oregon State put together its best drive of the day. Over a 3:28 span the Beavers fought for 65 yards and its only offensive touchdown of the game.

"We were running out of time," Oregon head coach Rich Brooks said. "If we were going to win

this football game, we needed to make something happen pretty quick."

With the Ducks trailing 13-10 and just under five minutes remaining in the game, the offense started its victory drive at its own 30-yard line. The first play of the five-play, 70-yard drive, in which O'Neil was four of five passing, was a post pattern to Cristin McLemore for a 31-yard gain, to the Beaver 39-yard line.

"It was a play that we like to work a lot and a play that we've been very successful with in the past two years, with Cristin running it," O'Neil said.

After receiving a five-yard false start penalty, the drive came to a climatic end. O'Neil rolled out to his left, much like the first touchdown throw, and hit Dino Philyaw in the flat. Philyaw turned on the jets and scampered the rest of the 19 yards for the touchdown. Matt Belden's extra point attempt was good.

"The screen pass to Philyaw was so well executed that it even brought a little bit of a smile to my face," Brooks said. "It showed Danny's comeback ability. He brought us back three times this year from a deficit in the second half. That's how you win championships — when you make plays when you have to."

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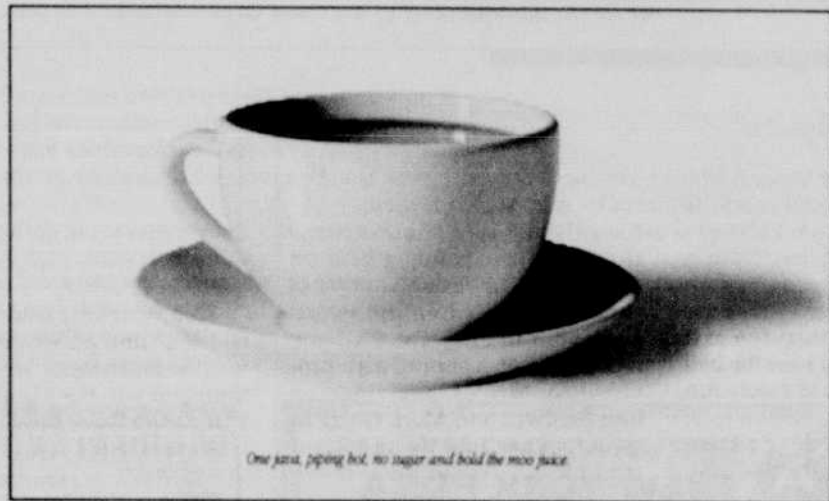
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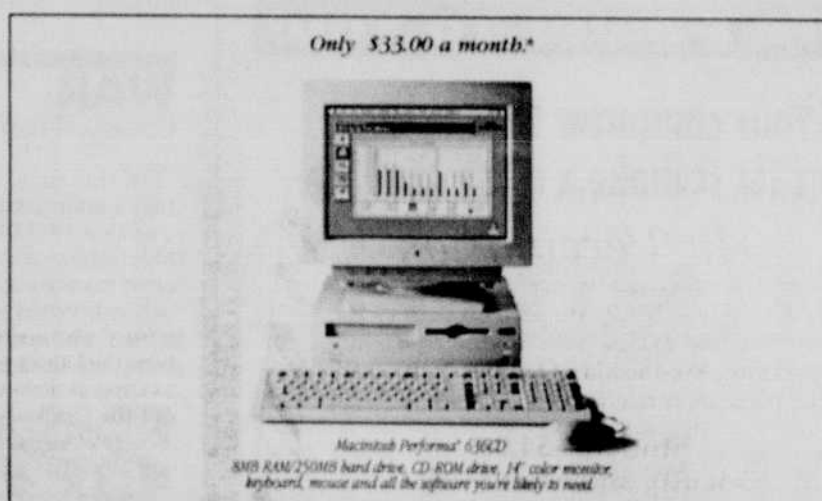
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
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
