to individual and collective prosperity. Thus in addition to selling creations, both are hardily encouraged.

Services and other items found in the market last year included hair cutting, massages, Tarot card readings, handmade jewelry, rugs, paper, ornaments, pottery, body products and herbal products.

"You find exotic things that you won't see just anywhere," said Shelly Sheklow, a market spokeswoman.

The items for the silent auction were donated by local businesses. People will have the opportunity to walk around the items up for bid and outbid anyone whose name is on the list by writing their names on a piece of paper next to the item with their new bid.

All money from the silent auction will go toward creating a Womyn's Directory and sustaining the Holiday Market.

"Last year we just barely covered the cost," White said. "It's entirely volunteer and non-profit."

Some of the items sold at last year's auction were bookstore gift certificates, massage gift certificates, bird feeders, handmade hats, art and handmade jewelry. According to White, there are a wide variety of things put up for bid in the auction.

In addition to the market and the auction, there will be the Evening Goddess Celebration from 7 to 9 p.m. This will be a gathering for women to celebrate their spirituality together.

"The women will go around in a circle and share what we want to create in our lives and attempt to manifest it," White said. "Women will come together to celebrate their lives and spirituality together."

White said this will be an opportunity for all different spiritual practices to participate rather than prescribing one for everyone. The night celebration accepts sliding donations depending on economic means, but no one will be turned away.

to fly through Northwest Airlines' Minneapolis hub Sunday, airline spokesman Jon Austin said. Approximately 100 Northwest flights were canceled, affecting about 10 percent of those travelers, he said.

In western Tennessee, tornadoes touched down in Crockett, Fayette, Weakley and Shelby counties, said Dan Pitchford, spokesman for the state Emergency Management Agency. One person was killed in Friendship in Crockett County.

Two tornadoes touched down in the Memphis suburb of Germantown, Pitchford said.

Wind gusted 50 and 60 mph in parts of Arkansas. A mobile home was torn from its foundation, carried 20 yards and dropped upside down, Sharp County sheriff's office dispatcher Donna Middlebrook said. The

three people inside were treated for cuts and bruises.

One resident reported a tornado on the ground, she said. "Three cows were killed. It put them up in some trees," Middlebrook said. "We've got a johnboat about 30 feet off the ground in some pine trees."

At Clinton in Van Buren County, six to eight houses and two businesses were damaged by wind and falling trees, Police Chief Loy Dewey said. Ten to 12 airplanes were heavily damaged at the municipal airport, he said.

In the area of snowfall, more than 100 traffic accidents, mostly fender-benders but some with injuries, were reported in the Minneapolis area, said Lisa Dockery, a dispatcher at the Hennepin County Sheriff's Department.

In Wisconsin, La Crosse County sheriff's dispatcher Sue Whitewater summed up the weather: "Horrible."

"We've had lots of accidents," Whitewater said. "No major injuries, but very slippery roads. We have crews out, but people are insisting on driving where they oughtn't to anyway."

Travel was hazardous across central South Dakota and much of North Dakota, where 8 inches of snow was possible in the Bismarck area.

Snow and ice brought down power lines in Nebraska and caused scattered outages across the state, utilities reported. Up to 7 inches of snow fell in the state's northeast corner.

"The guys said the biggest problem was not repairing what was down, but it was getting there because of the ice and snow," spokesman for the Nebraska Public Power District, Ron Bogus said.

In Iowa, about 5,000 customers lost power near Mason City.
