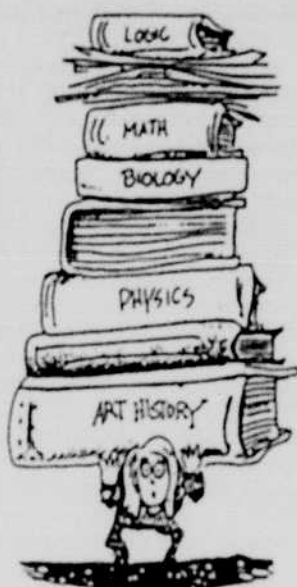


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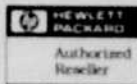

husband's political future, which could include a run for the 1996 Republican presidential nomination.

"It's nothing. It's basically a blip and he will continue with the timetable that he set for himself and will be back on his feet shortly and will decide what he wants to do with the future," she said.

Quayle went to the emergency room for a chest X-ray Sunday because he wasn't feeling well, said Dr. Deborah Allen, his family physician. Allen said doctors were exploring a number of diagnoses, including walking pneumonia, before conditions worsened Monday.

He was sent home with a prescription but returned to the hospital Monday after complaining of shortness of breath, and doctors found that a blood clot had traveled to his lung, Perry said.

Pulmonary embolisms start in the calf of a leg and work their way up the body, through the heart and become lodged in the pulmonary vein of one of the lungs.

An average of 650,000 to 700,000 people have such clots each year, said Dr. Joseph H. Bates, chief of medical services at the Little Rock Veterans Administration Medical Center and president of the American Lung Association.

About 5 to 10 percent die suddenly from them, he said.

"The families are the ones that will be shattered the most from losing a family member who has been influenced to seek assisted suicide," Alderman said.

According to the plaintiffs,

Ballot Measure 16 does not promote caring for terminally ill patients.

"As a community we are in need of more caring, not less caring," Lee said. "I think people see death and dying as a messy thing that needs cleaning."

According to Lee, assisted suicide is not the way to clean things up.
