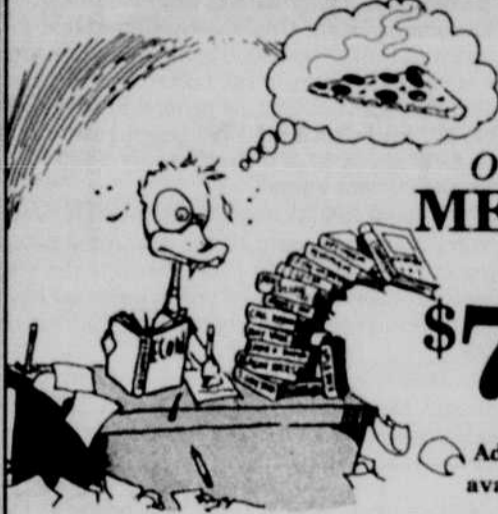

## List of journalists who were killed compiled in report

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ten immigrant journalists have been murdered in the United States since 1981 for covering news that disturbed political factions from their native countries, according to a report released Wednesday by a private group.

The deaths noted by the Committee to Protect Journalists: five Vietnamese newspaper and magazine journalists; three Haitian radio hosts who supported President Jean-Bertrand Aristide; a Chinese-American reporter in California; and a Cuban-American publisher in New York.

Of those cases, only two have been solved, mostly because of pressure from the ethnic communities where they worked, according to the report. "Silenced: The Unsolved Murders of Immigrant Journalists in the United States."

"The purpose of this report here is not to consider these unresolved cases closed but to underline that they remain open," William Orme, the committee's executive director, said at a news conference.

He released a letter to Attorney General Janet Reno asking her to create a national task force, led by the FBI, to try to solve the murders. The letter, signed by more than 25 human rights and journalism groups, asks the FBI to coordinate efforts with local and state authorities where the murders occurred.

The committee began investigating journalists' deaths in the United States after the killing in 1992 of Manuel de Dios Unanue, a free-lance journalist and author and former editor in chief of El Diario-La Prensa, a New York-based Spanish-language daily.

De Dios, 48, was assassinated by a hit man allegedly hired by Colombia's Cali cocaine cartel to stop his reporting on the drug trade. The killer, Wilson Alejandro Mejia-Velez, was sentenced last March to life without parole.

Orme said that as a result of

that case, the committee began receiving calls from reporters seeking background on other journalists killed in the United States. The committee compiles an annual report on attacks on the press abroad but had never done similar research in the United States, he said.

"It seemed that no one had ever actually gone through the work of compiling a detailed list" of journalists killed in the United States, he said.

Ana Arana, the committee's coordinator for the Americas, began the research and discovered 12 cases dating back to 1976, including the murders of Americans Don Bolles of the *Arizona Republic* and Alan Berg, a Denver radio talk show host. All the other cases involved immigrant reporters working in languages other than English, Orme said.

"All of them bore the earmarks of domestic terrorism," he added.

The other immigrant case that was solved was the murder of Henry Liu, in Daly City, Calif., by a Taiwanese hit team in 1984 on orders of the Taiwanese government.

The Vietnamese journalists whose cases remain open are: Lam Tron Duong in San Francisco; Nguyen Dam Phong in Houston; Tap Van Pham in Garden Grove, Calif.; and Nhan Trong Do and Triet Le in Fairfax County, Va. Right-wing exile groups have claimed responsibility, according to the report.

The Haitian journalists who were killed: Jean-Claude Olivier, Fritz Dor and Dona St. Plite, all in Miami. All had received politically-motivated death threats from supporters of the Haitian military, the committee found. Dor and Olivier were killed in 1991 by the same gun. St. Plite was killed more than two years later while attending a benefit on behalf of Dor's family. His accused assassin is awaiting trial.

## Social Security paying some households several checks

WASHINGTON (AP) — A small percentage of low-income families collect federal disability benefits for more than one child, the Social Security Administration said Wednesday.

The report was prompted by concerns that some families receiving checks from Supplemental Security Income have several disabled children on the rolls and, as a result, are paid in excess of \$2,000 or \$3,000 a month tax-free.

SSI pays a maximum of \$446 a month. The program limits payments to married couples to \$669 but has no similar maximum for families or households with several recipients on the rolls.

Social Security, which runs the SSI program for the elderly and disabled poor, said field office employees occasionally report that some households are receiving large checks.

In one current case provided by a field office in the Midwest, a couple and five children ages 17 to 22 receive disability benefits totaling \$3,004 a month. All five children receive SSI. The family also collects Social Security disability insurance, as well as \$229 a month in Aid to Families with Dependent Children for the wife and child of the 22-year-old son.

Through a spokesman, Social Security Commissioner Shirley Chater said she is concerned about sending large sums of cash to multi-recipient households, and that those concerns prompted her to request the study. She said the agency is looking at ways to address the issue but declined to list specifics.

Just over 6 million people receive SSI. In March 1994, 400,000 recipients were living in married couple households and were subject to a restriction on their benefits.

Another 513,460 recipients were living with other SSI recipients in a total of 213,040 households.

The agency, however, estimates that there are 300 households nationwide with six recipients, 200 households with seven recipients, 40 households with eight recipients, and 60 households with 12 people on SSI.

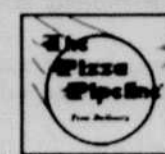
