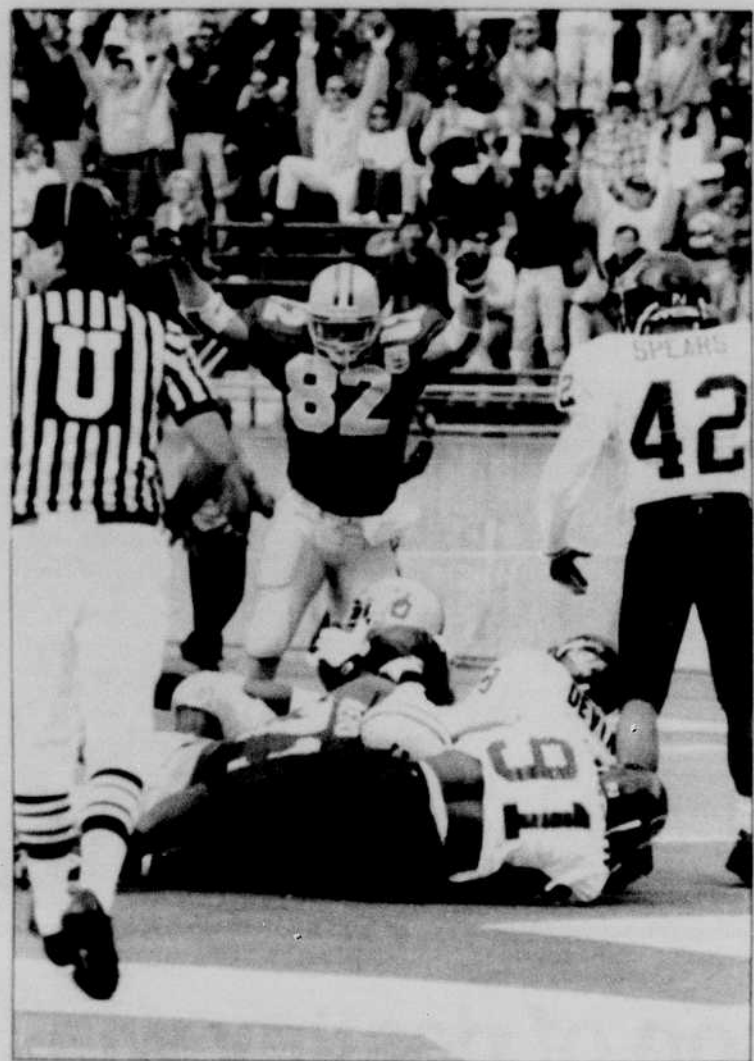

third downs in the second half and held on to beat the Ducks 21-7.

**Oct. 15 at Autzen Stadium** — The Ducks were able to dominate the line of scrimmage on their way to a 23-7 shellacking of California. Tailbacks Whittle and Philyaw rushed for 177 and 130 yards, respectively, and Oregon ran for more than 300 yards for the first time since 1992. This against a Cal team that came into Eugene allowing only 96 yards rushing a game and was second in the league in total defense, surrendering only 268 yards of total offense a game for the season. The Ducks raced to 400 yards of total offense, with only 96 yards passing. Oregon's defense limited the Golden Bears to 162 yards of total offense.

**Oct. 22 at Autzen Stadium** — Oregon made the big plays when it needed them and overwhelmed ninth-ranked Washington 31-20. Down 20-17 to the Huskies, O'Neil drove the team 98 yards in the fourth quarter to retake the lead and dispel all rumors that he couldn't lead the Ducks to a come-from-behind victory. Wheaton picked off a Washington pass at the 3-yard-line with just over one minute left in the game and raced 97 yards for the game-clinching touchdown. Gang Green held Huskies' Heisman contender Napoleon Kaufman to 101 yards on 23 carries — well below his season average of 167.3 rushing yards per game.

**Oct. 29 at Autzen Stadium** — Oregon's Gang Green defense went nose-to-nose with the high-octane Arizona offense and came out ahead of the 11th-ranked Wildcats, 10-9. O'Neil, completing his second-straight comeback effort, hit Wilcox and timing pattern in the endzone for the only touchdown of the game in the fourth quarter. The Ducks' defense held Arizona to 31 yards in the air and eight yards rushing in the second half, and only 236 yard of total offense.

**Nov. 5 at Autzen Stadium** — The offense was reborn as O'Neil threw 66 and 67-yard touchdown passes to McLemore and true freshman Pat Johnson, respectively. Whittle took the ball 67 yards through a gaping hole and punctuated his effort by spiking himself in the endzone. The Duck offense compiled 515 yards of total offense on the day and the Gang Green defense dominated the Sun Devils all afternoon en route to a 34-10 dismantling of Arizona State.

**Nov. 12 at Stanford** — O'Neil connected with McLemore for three of his six touchdown passes on the day in the Ducks' 55-21 rout of the Cardinal. McLemore's efforts helped him surpass Bobby Moore in the Oregon record books for touchdown receptions. Gang Green bent a little in the mud at Palo Alto, resulting in Stanford's 452 yards of total offense, most coming after the Ducks had the game in hand.

**Nov. 19 at Oregon State** — Gang Green and a resilient Oregon offense took advantage of an improbable Civil War tilt for the Rose Bowl bid and overcame a stingy Beavers' team 17-13. Philyaw scored on screen passes of 18 and 19 yards, respectively, and the Ducks' defense stood firm against Oregon State to win outright Oregon's first Pac-10 Conference championship in 37 years. O'Neil's two touchdown passes tied him with Bill Musgrave as the school leader in career touchdown passes.
