

MEN

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Ducks atop the Pac-10 with a 3-0 league record and pushed Oregon into the third week of the league season undefeated for the first time since 1976-77.

Oregon, 11-1 overall, used a full-court press and an 11-deep roster to completely frustrate the Beavers and leave them in shock after one of the worst losses for Oregon State in the history of the Civil War. The Ducks' 96 points are the most points they have ever scored against the Beavers.

"I know a lot of people doubted whether we could win on the road," Oregon guard Orlando Williams said. "We showed we can not only win on the road, but do it convincingly."

Kenya Wilkins, the team's most successful thief, paced Oregon with 3 of its 10 steals. But it was the Beavers' lack of composure that pushed the Ducks to victory.

Oregon State was forced into 18 first-half turnovers and wound up with 24 for the entire game — seven more than the Beavers' season-high. The Beavers' ineptness almost

seemed comical as their passes sailed through the air with reckless abandon, finding more court-side spectators than players.

The Ducks got 41 points off the bench and Williams, who made 9-of-14 shots, led 10 Oregon scorers with 25 points. Nine of the 11 team members to play for Oregon played at least 13 minutes against Oregon State.

"This team is amazing," Oregon head coach Jerry Green said about his balanced attack. "They don't care who plays."

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hard, physical game, but the Ducks style of play, coupled with tough officiating, kept the Beaver's from making an impact.

"I was expecting a lot more pressure," junior center Renae Fegent said. "We thought they were going to come out and full court pressure us right from the beginning."

The Ducks defense also tired the Beavers out, as the Ducks collected 15 offensive rebounds to go with their 26 defensive boards.

"I thought we boxed out and did a better job on

defense tonight," Runge said. "(We) didn't let their outside shooting game open up."

The Beavers were off almost the whole game, as they got in foul trouble early and ended up sending the Ducks to the foul line 27 times.

"They were starting to get really frustrated and foul harder," Boyer said.

And, according to Boyer, the game is a reflection of the team's ultimate goal this season.

"All along we've been contending that we want to get back to the NCAA tournament again this year," Boyer said. "Tonight we are just one step closer."

cross country like this," Finley said. "It's important to wrestle Midwest teams and east coast teams because there is a different style in every different area and we've got to get used to this."

"I'd rather meet it here than meet it like this in nationals. We'll definitely know what to look for next time we meet them."

Senior Cory Sonnen got the Ducks only win by beating the Badgers' Ryan Lord in overtime in the 142-pound matchup. Sonnen improved his record to 12-4 overall. The Ducks dropped to a 2-4 overall record as the Badgers improved to 3-1.

"It was nice that Cory got a win in there," Finley said. "We

really didn't have very many bright spots."

Two of Oregon's best wrestlers, 118-pound Kevin Roberts and 126-pound Jeremy Ensrud, both lost in overtime, and another of the Oregon mainstays, Peter Stayner, was pinned as the Badgers won nine of the meet's ten matches and made a run at moving up in the polls.

"They did a great job of shutting us down," Finley said. "They took away our offense. I think that we really count on wins in the first two weights. So far this year they have been very consistent in their winning, and have done a great job for us."

"But the rest of the guys have got to understand that if somebody doesn't win they have got pick it up along the way and make up the difference."

According to Wisconsin coach Barry Davis, the two matches set up his team's overall performance.

"This year they ranked us 21st but I think we're a much better team," Davis added. "Those two matches, I think, were going to set the tone for the whole night."

"I didn't see any weak spots in their lineup," Finley said of the 21st ranked Badgers. "Or at least we didn't find any."

But, Finley said, the lopsided score doesn't mean that the outcome will be the same in the NCAA tournament.

"There were some real close matches," Finley said, pinpointing Roberts' and Ensrud's matches. "I would guess that the next time they wrestle, it could just as easily go the other way."
