

Owners reluctant to return to bargaining table

NEW YORK (AP) — Baseball owners said Wednesday they will return to the bargaining table only when asked by mediator W.J. Utery, and they accused the union of threatening to take money away from possible replacement players.

On Tuesday, union head Donald Fehr accused acting commissioner Bud Selig of lying to members of Congress by saying the union is refusing to resume negotiations. Selig, claiming Fehr was relying on "second-hand information," said what he told congressmen was that the union hadn't seriously bargained.

"I and other club owners told members of Congress that the strike will be resolved only when both parties return to the

bargaining table and address the fundamental issue of labor costs," Selig wrote in a letter to Fehr that was made public.

"If Bud would actually come to negotiations, he might know what was actually going on. He doesn't," Fehr countered in a telephone interview. "I notice he emphatically does not deny that it was them who broke off negotiations, withdrew all their proposals and imposed their salary cap."

Management's 12-member negotiating committee is to meet with Utery in Washington on Thursday.

"Hopefully that meeting and his discussions with you will convince him that it would be productive to resume negotiations," Selig wrote. "When Mr.

Utery asks us to return to the table, we will do so."

Owners broke off talks Dec. 22 and implemented a salary cap the following day. Fehr says the union would have continued talks. In his letter Selig told Fehr that the clubs "vigorously disagree with your interpretation of the breakoff."

"Over the last four weeks, the union made only two comprehensive proposals to the clubs, both of which merely redistributed revenue among the clubs," Selig wrote.

Management lawyer Chuck O'Connor, in a two-page memo sent to clubs, accused the union of threatening possible replacements with the loss of licensing money, pension benefits and collusion money. While arbitra-

tor Thomas Roberts make the final decisions on collusion, the union makes recommendations to him.

"Because these threats appear to be quite pervasive, several clubs have asked whether the federal labor laws allow the union to engage in such pervasive conduct," O'Connor wrote in the memo, which was obtained by The Associated Press.

Fehr denied the charge, saying, "The notion is silly."

"Roberts will decide whatever Roberts decides," he said. "We have no influence. Whatever benefits players have, they have. Whatever licensing money they have, they have."

"It's too bad that Chuck is reduced to that kind of allega-

tion. It's another indication that their desire is to throw out red herrings rather than confront anything serious."

Leon Durham, according to several sources, was one of the former players who reported being threatened with the loss of payments if he became a replacement.

"That's one of the factors the players have to take into consideration," said Durham's agent, Dick Moss. "But that's secondary to moral factors."

Selig, speaking by telephone from Milwaukee, said he wasn't concerned at this point about the Baltimore Orioles' refusal to use replacements.

"We'll talk about it at some future point," he said.
