The newcomers are junior-college transfer forward Lamont Daniels, last week's West Coast Conference player of the week, and freshman point guard Dionn Holton.

Daniels scored five points in the final 57 seconds last week in the Pilots' 81-79 victory over San Francisco. Holton is the nephew of former UCLA and NBA player Michael Holton, who is a Portland assistant.

"This is really his first year of playing point and he's been pretty much error-free," Chavez said.

"He has 21 turnovers in 14 games. That's pretty good for a freshman."

The Pilots play in 5,000-seat Chiles Center, one of the nicest buildings in the WCC. Chavez knows the potential if he can build a winner, something the Pilots haven't been since 1982. They made it to the NCAA Tournament only once, in 1959.

"That's one of the reasons I was interested in applying for the job when it opened," he said. "I think there's a great chance to do something positive here. We have a really nice facility, one of the premier academic institutions in the Northwest and it doesn't get any better than the city of Portland."

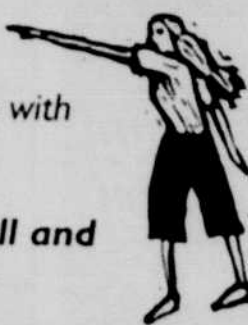
