Review Board will decide Thursday whether to approve or postpone the application.

If the board decides to postpone it, the University's permit will be delayed 120 days from the time the application was considered complete on Dec. 9. This will allow supporters of the threatened site more time to seek other options such as moving the housing units to another site or finding a potential buyer.

Even if the board were to approve the University's application for demolition, an appeal to the Eugene City Council can be requested. Depending on the decision reached by the council, it could then be appealed a step further to the Land Use Appeals Board, which would further interfere with the University's plans for demolition.

Mike Eyster, director of University Housing, announced last Thursday that the first phase of the University's demolition plan — to remove the houses this spring — will continue.

Phase one will involve the demolition and rebuilding of buildings that are already vacated. This phase will include construction of new community, child care and laundry facilities.

If there are no further delays, phase one is expected to be ready for occupancy by fall term 1996.

Opposition to these plans will be addressed at Wednesday night's vigil by OSPIRG representatives and other supporters in favor of saving Amazon. Those who attend the vigil will also be asked to show their support by attending Thursday's board meeting at 7:30 a.m. in City Hall.

"We're hoping by gathering the public together, we can encourage the University to go back to the table and find a way to preserve low-income housing like they've contended they want to do," said Nancy Forrest, spokeswoman for the Save Amazon Coalition. "We believe that because the University is supposed to be a body that answers to the people, they definitely should follow the law, which is clearly on the side of preservation."

According to David Zupan, a member of the Save Amazon Coalition, all members of the public are invited to attend the vigil, and bring their own candles and signs.

The vigil will begin between 5 and 5:15 p.m. on 22nd Avenue and Patterson Drive at the north end of the Amazon housing site.

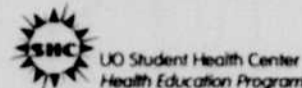
