Young's six touchdowns dispel ghost of Joe

MIAMI (AP) — Steve Young simply wanted to get out from under the shadow of Joe Montana.

He did more than that Sunday, obliterating it with six touchdown passes as the San Francisco 49ers overwhelmed San Diego 49-26 to become the first team ever to win five Super Bowls.

Young's six TD passes broke the Super Bowl record of five set five years ago by Montana, who led San Francisco to its first four titles. Jerry Rice caught three of them and Ricky Watters caught two more and ran 9 yards for a third score.

"This is something you'll never

er forget," Rice told Young as the quarterback cradled the Vince Lombardi Trophy after the game.

Young said:
"You can't describe the feeling. That's why football is the

ultimate team game. When you get there, you share it with 50 other guys. It's geometric — 50 times 50 — the elation you feel."

In a Super Bowl that was everything it was supposed to be, a rout, the Niners became the 11th straight NFC team to win the NFL title.

Young, the unanimous MVP, finished 24-for-36 for 325 yards without an interception. He also was the game's leading rusher with 49 yards on five carries before leaving with 5:39 left.

"Whatever critics he may have had, he proved tonight that he's one of the greatest quarterbacks of all time," 49ers coach George Seifert said of Young.

It took exactly 4 minutes and 55 seconds for San Francisco to demoralize the Chargers, playing in the Super Bowl for the first time. Touchdown passes by Young of 44 yards to Rice and 51 yards to Watters did the trick.

But more important to Young, it was a smashing certification in his exorcism of Montana's ghost. More important to the 49ers, it completed their single-minded mission of winning the Super Bowl after losing the NFC title game three of the last four years.

It also gave Seifert a Super Bowl title he can call all his own

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ASU dances way to 79-76 win over struggling Ducks

Arizona State played up to its billing as the 13th-ranked team in the nation and proved to be too much for the hapless Oregon men's team on Saturday night.

You see, not only did Frieder's 13th-ranked Sun Devils get ripped off by the Beavers in Corvallis on Thursday, but a break-in of his room at the team's hotel between 9:37 p.m.

and 10:34 p.m. on Friday evening here in Eugene tended to put yet another damper on his already dysfunctional trip to the Northwest.

"I got robbed at the Valley River Inn, River Valley Inn, whatever the hell it's called," Frieder said. "Someone broke in my room and stole all my stuff — my money, my credit cards, my briefcase, my keys, my airline tickets, my game tickets, everything that I had."

Frieder estimated that \$5,000 in personal and team expense money was taken as both his briefcase and his wife's purse were missing when he got back

to his room after a brief trip to the hotel's lobby.

"It was a rewarding win considering all that," he said.

Needless to say, Frieder had quite a bit on his mind going into the contest against the 18th-ranked Ducks. And considering all the obvious inconveniences that went along with the theft, he went not to tell his team in an effort to keep the real task at hand in the minds of his players.

"It was important for me to stay focused after that happened," Frieder said. "I didn't want my team to know it

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
