The facility is owned by the Cow Creek Band of the Umpqua Indians and is partially managed by the tribal council. Sue Shaffer, the chairwoman of the board of the Cow Creek Band, said the tribe labored for years to secure the financing to build the facility and plans to proceed cautiously.

Shaffer said banks were reluctant to lend the tribe money because they had few assets and because Native American tribes have autonomy from the United States' legal system, to a degree, and cannot be sued.

After a four-year search, the tribal council obtained a direct loan from the Bureau of Indian Affairs, a national Native American support organization. The council worked hard on the gaming project because they did not have other revenue sources, Shaffer said.

"Our band has almost 800 members," she said. "We have no fishing money, no hydroelectric money and no timber money. So we have a lot invested in this project."

The center employs 170 people but only seven of those are tribal members.

Shaffer said she is confident Cow Creek will be a success. "This place has provided a nice, clean center for entertainment," she said. "People can relax and enjoy themselves. They don't even have to spend a lot of money. You can play bingo all evening for \$9."

dinner or at plays designed to create awareness, is more effective.

While Fowler's idea is only in the planning stages, she said she hopes to gain enough signatures to alert the dean of student's office and University Housing that this is something students think is important enough to make mandatory.

Fowler proposes to have a 15-minute presentation at each initial mandatory residence hall meeting. The talk would include some common rape myths and what men and women can do to avoid risky situations.

Some myths Fowler wants to dispel include women who dress provocatively or go out drinking

want to have sex, and rapists are sexually deprived, crazy and/or people of color.

Additionally, she wants to break the image of the rapist being the stranger who jumps out of the bushes. In reality, 84 percent of rape survivors know their attackers and 57 percent of rapes occur on dates, she said.

At the presentations, further information in the form of brochures would be handed to new students, Smith said.

Members of various campus organizations, she said, have told her they would be interested in giving some of the presentations, so the work wouldn't fall solely on the administration's shoulders.

"I'm willing to be completely flexible if [the administration]

just puts something in the mandatory dorm meetings, and that way everyone would hear," she said.

Although she was never raped in the dorms, when she thinks back to all the ignorance and risks that people took in the dorms, she considers herself very lucky.

"I just want to protect the men and women who come here and they don't know what is going on," she said. "It's about education; you can't know something unless someone tells you."

Anyone interested in signing the petition, which would encourage the University to mandate sexual assault awareness in the residence halls, can sign it in the ASUO Women's Center in the EMU basement.

education revenue.

Members from Oregon Student Lobby are happy about the results. The proposal originally came to the House stating that only kindergarten through grade 12 would be included. After some lobbying by student groups and legislators, higher education would receive the funds if the ballot measure passes.

"Finally education is being seen as kindergarten

through higher education instead of kindergarten through 12th grade," said Ryan Coonerty, ASUO state affairs coordinator.

Senate President Gordon Smith, R-Pendleton, wants to add a proposal to use part of lottery funds to create an education trust fund.

The House vote was unanimous. However, Rep. Margaret Carter, D-Portland, said she made a mistake and later would seek House permission to change her vote to "no," according to Associated Press reports.
