



Mat men rebound, split weekend meets

The Oregon wrestling team rebounded from a lackluster loss to Oregon State on Friday night by whipping Brigham Young 26-6 on Saturday.

On Friday, the team was sluggish and dropped two of the first three weight classes as the Beavers racked up a 29-9 victory. With Peter Stayner facing a possible season-ending back injury and Matt Sprague out with a shoulder injury, the team lost to Oregon State, even though the Beaver's No. 1-ranked 177-pound mainstay Les Gutches was out with an injury.

"I think we just didn't wrestle very good at all against Oregon State," Oregon head coach Ron Finley said. "They came out really fired up, and they came out to get, and we just didn't rise to the occasion."

But the Ducks came alive on Saturday, winning the first five weight classes against Brigham Young and eight of the 10 total matches.

And the Ducks kept on win-

Ducks cling to victory against home-weary Cal

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP) — Orlando Williams scored 23 points, including four 3-pointers in the second half, as No. 22 Oregon defeated California 94-86 Saturday, sending the Bears to a school record sixth straight home loss.

Williams hit two 3-pointers as Oregon opened the second half with a 14-2 run, and hit two more later in the period as the Ducks (13-5, 5-4 Pac-10) built a lead of as many as 21 points.

The Bears (11-7, 3-6) went on a late 22-6 run to pull within five points with 1:48 left but could get no closer. Guard Randy Duck came off the bench to hit three 3-pointers for Cal during the rally.

Darryl Parker had 18 points for Oregon, which broke a three-game losing streak, and Jeff Potter added 17.

Tremaine Fowlkes led Cal with 21 points. Monty Buckley scored 20 and Duck had 13.

The Bears have not won at home since Dec. 28. Saturday's game was played at the Oakland Coliseum Arena, one of Cal's two home courts.

Oregon, leading by one point at halftime, scored the first five points of the second half. Buckley hit a jumper for Cal to pull the Bears within 45-41, but the Ducks hit three straight 3-pointers, one by Madden and then two by Williams, to build the Oregon lead to 54-41.

The Ducks quickly increased the margin to 37 points, taking a 62-45 lead on another Williams 3-pointer, and led 79-58 before Cal began its late rally.

Oregon had a 40-39 halftime lead, despite trailing 21-9 early in the half. Parker led the Ducks with nine points, while Buckley had 11 points for the Bears in the first half.

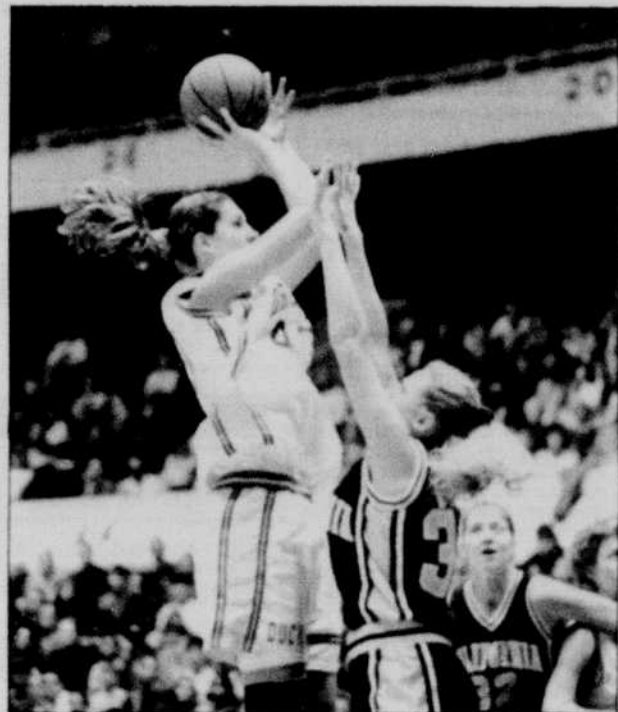

Oregon women stay in the thick of Pac-10 race with win over Cal

The Oregon women's basketball team, knowing it needed to win to stay in reach of the Pacific 10 Conference's top three teams, beat the visiting California Golden Bears on Saturday 77-59.

"We knew it was going to be a tough game. Cal needs to win as badly as we do, and we knew it wasn't going to be easy coming in," Oregon head coach Jody Runge said.

At the start of the game, Runge's hypothesis was true. The Bears (7-10, 2-6 Pac-10) caught the Ducks (12-6, 5-4) off guard, pushing out to an early 10-4 lead in the first four minutes of play.

"I just had this ill feeling before the game that we were going to come out flat because the monkey was on our back," Runge said.

Once the Ducks got back into the game, they quickly closed in on the Bears early lead. At the 12:38 mark,

Oregon's Arianne Boyer collected her first of two blocked shots and four assists when she stole the ball from California's Patti Czepiec and made a baseball pass to a streaking Sally Crowe.

Crowe took the ball between two California defenders in the paint, and made her patented "from-the-hip" layup to cut the lead to 15-11. After connecting with Crowe, Boyer made three straight baskets to give the Ducks their first lead of the game, 17-15.

The Ducks returned to their great defensive play that had been missing in Oregon's last three losses. The Ducks held the Bears to 34.9 percent from the field while collecting 44 rebounds, nine steals and four blocked shots.

With 6:25 remaining in the first half and an 11-4 run to end the half. During the run the prettiest play of the

The Oregon men's tennis team improved their record to 9-4, with road wins against Marquette and Wisconsin-Green Bay on Saturday.

After losing to Wisconsin on Friday 7-4, Oregon bounced back over the weekend with victories at Marquette, 5-2, and then came up only one set short of sweeping Wisconsin-Green Bay, 6-1, as Josh Prager lost in the third set (4-6, 6-4, 6-3) to UWGB's Mike Roth.

Hans Forsberg led the Ducks as the No. 1 seed, scoring straight-set victories against both of his competitors. John DeVors and Mike Goldstein also scored two wins apiece. Forsberg teamed with Dougal Williams to notch their eighth and ninth doubles wins also.
