New advocate seeks reform

New Multicultural Affairs Advocate Emily Lerma has dreams of a "multiculturalized" University.

The ambitious freshman said that finding ways to integrate multiculturalism into the University's curriculum is her big project for the term. She will start where former Multicultural advocate, Yohana Kinberg, left off by organizing a Multicultural Reform Conference, and scheduling meetings for a Multicultural Curriculum Task Force, she said.

Kinberg, who left the University when her family moved to New York last term, was in the process of organizing a conference which would inform faculty and students about how to integrate multiculturalism into everyday curriculum.

Besides continuing this project, Lerma said that she will hold Multicultural Curriculum Task Force meetings, which will involve faculty, administrators and students interested in curriculum reform.

Lerma, who was appointed multicultural advocate this term, said that integrating student opinion is the key to multicultural curriculum reform.

Several student group representatives at a meeting Monday night in the Multicultural Center said they felt the best way to include multicultural issues into the curriculum is to develop an Ethnic Studies department and possibly a major.

According to Lerma, most other PAC-10 schools already have such departments. If the University wants to compete with these schools we have to offer an ethnic studies major, she said.

Students at the meeting said it is an unrealistic goal to expect every faculty member to integrate multicultural issues into their courses in an efficient way because they do not have the training to do so.

"It's hard to integrate multiculturalism into the whole curriculum when we don't have an ethnic studies program," said Multicultural Center Co-Director Daniela Diaz.

Senate approves new member

ASUO Student Senate filled a vacant Senate and Finance Committee position Monday, unanimously approving the appointment of Chris Kantrowitz.

Kantrowitz served under former ASUO President Bobby Lee in 1992 as a University Affairs intern, held positions on the KWVA Board of Directors and served on the EMU Board Budget Committee last year.

"I've been working with this

system for a long time," Kantrowitz said.

Kantrowitz filled Senate seat No. 2, which puts him on the Programs Finance Committee. He said he is looking forward to the challenge of allocating student incidental fees.

"It's our responsibility to make sure these funds are being spent responsibly," he said. "We are facing a real crunch here. I think a zero percent [benchmark] is a very feasible goal."

Kantrowitz filled the position left vacant earlier this term by

the resignation of John Howe.

The Senate also allocated a \$750 special request to the University Theatre. Money for special requests comes from surplus student fees.

Theatre Development Director Joseph Gilg requested the money to help host visiting students and faculty from the National Institute of The Arts in Taiwan. These performing arts students are participating in the Northwest Drama Conference at the University, Feb. 7 through 14.

'Mal-Thai Night' debuted dual cultures

After a month and a half of intense planning, practice and fund raising, the Malaysian and Thai Student Associations combined their efforts to display a spectacular performance in the EMU Ballroom Sunday night.

The night's theme "Mal-Thai Night," pronounced multi, refers to the "bridge of culture and diversity between two cultures," said Malaysian Student Association President Steven Chin, during opening comments made with Theerada (Jan) Suphaphong, president of the Thai Student Association.

Sunday's combined-culture night, which about 400 people attended, debuted Thailand as an active association and introduced the University to yet another important culture, which is often misunderstood.

"We wanted to dispel any bad images people have about Thailand ... and show a sample of how

the Thai people live," Suphaphong said.

The evening began with dinner of native cuisine, such as sambal chicken, nasi lemak (coconut rice), pad-thai (spiced noodles), fried tofu and green curry chicken gravy. Soon after, the chanting of the Thai success prayer, which is used to invoke success upon the completion of a big task, was heard throughout the room.

A traditional Malaysian war dance was followed by Thai boxing, a Malaysian martial arts performance called sital and fashion shows representing both countries. Cuisine from the land was served followed by traditional dances.

The Malaysian culture is comprised of three races: Malay, Chinese and Indian. Traces of the three races were seen during the fashion show when both the Thai and Malaysian models wore traditional and modern-style clothes from the various selections of the countries.

Currently there are 69 Malaysian and 28 Thai students enrolled at the University this term.
