

Duke ends slump, upsets ACC foe

DURHAM, N.C. (AP) — Duke broke out of its month-long slump Thursday night, snapping a nine-game Atlantic Coast Conference losing streak by finally hanging on down the stretch to beat No. 18 Georgia Tech 77-70.

The Blue Devils (11-11, 1-9 ACC) were on the verge of winning twice in the last two weeks, falling to No. 1 North Carolina and No. 8 Maryland by two points each. Both times, struggling Duke, last year's NCAA runner-up, just couldn't get a clutch play in the final moments without coach Mike Krzyzewski on the bench.

This time around the Blue Devils got key baskets by freshmen Trajan Langdon and Ricky

Price in a span of 20 seconds as Duke cooled off the ACC's hottest team.

The Yellow Jackets (15-7, 6-4) had won three straight conference games by an average of 17.3 points without leading scorer and rebounder James Forrest, who is sidelined with a broken hand.

But after storming back from an 11-point second-half deficit to take a 68-67 lead with 2:35 left on an eight-footer by Travis Best, the Yellow Jackets committed two turnovers that cost them the game.

Langdon hit a 15-foot jumper after Best's shot, but then Best, who scored 25 points, threw the ball away on Georgia Tech's

next possession. That turnover led to Price's short banker for a 71-68 Duke lead.

Drew Barry, the ACC's assist leader, then threw away another pass with 1:26 remaining. Duke, the worst free-throw shooting team in the league, made four straight foul shots over the next 19 seconds to seal the win.

Cherokee Parks led Duke, which avoided losing in Cameron Indoor Stadium for a fifth straight time, with 16 points and 10 rebounds.

After gaining its first halftime lead since Jan. 14 at 41-37, Duke went on a 10-2 run in the second half to take a 54-43 lead with 12:28 left before the Yellow Jackets staged their comeback.

New starter hits game-winners for Hogs

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (AP) — Elmer Martin, a senior making his first start of the season, made two free throws with 32 seconds left and No. 12 Arkansas slipped past Memphis 88-87 Thursday night despite some poor free throw shooting.

The Razorbacks' Darnell Robinson missed two free throws with 13 seconds left and the Tigers (17-6) had two opportunities for the win. Robert Reed blocked Chris Garner's drive with less than four seconds to play and Mingo Johnson's 3-pointer was way off at the buzzer.

The Tigers' last lead was 40-39 late in the first half and Arkansas (18-5) led 61-47 with 16 minutes left. The Razorbacks made only nine of 20 free

throws in the second half and the Tigers took advantage to close within 77-75 with 4:30 minutes to play. That's when Scotty Thurman, who had missed six of nine shots in the second half, made a 3-pointer.

Johnson's free throw made it 84-81, but he missed his second attempt. Lorenzen Wright rebounded and was fouled, but he missed the front end of a 1-and-1.

Arkansas led 86-83 when Corliss Williamson, who tied his season high with 28 points, drove to the basket. Martin, who had attempted only six free throws all year, set a screen and was fouled. His free throws gave Arkansas the lead for good.

Oakley accused of hitting security guard

NEW YORK (AP) — New York Knicks forward Charles Oakley has been accused in a \$2.5 million lawsuit of hitting a security guard during a special event at Tavern on the Green when asked to show a ticket.

Chris Nunez, 23, said in court papers that the basketball player arrived at the glitzy Central Park restaurant last June 16 and entered without showing a ticket, over the objections of security people.

Nunez's court papers said he

asked the All-Star forward to step out of the room and Oakley "responded with abusive and derogatory language, and thereupon struck plaintiff upon the neck."

The blow left Nunez in pain and "unable to remain gainfully employed," according to papers filed Wednesday in Manhattan's State Supreme Court. The suit also stated that Nunez has had unspecified medical costs related to the alleged assault.

Neil Draddy, who works for

Oakley's agent, William Pollack, said, "We would rather not comment on the suit without talking to Charles. We haven't been able to reach him." He said Oakley was in Phoenix for the All-Star game.

Nunez, formerly of Jersey City and now living in San Rafael, Calif., is asking \$2 million compensatory damages and \$500,000 in punitive damages.

Claims made in a lawsuit give only one side of the case.

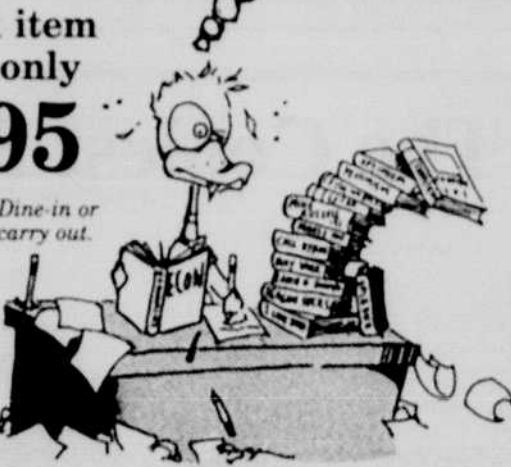
