Cross, Knight propel Cardinal over Bears

PALO ALTO, Calif. (AP) — Dion Cross scored 18 points and Brevin Knight added 16 and a school-record 12 assists Wednesday night as No. 17 Stanford completed a season sweep of California with an 83-70 victory.

Stanford (16-5, 7-5 Pac-10) broke a season-high two-game losing streak, while the Bears (12-9, 4-8) lost for the fourth time in five games.

The Cardinal outscored the Bears 13-1 early in the second half to take a 49-35 following David Harbour's layup with 12:40 to play. Cal went over seven minutes without a field goal at that point

Cal went over seven minutes without a field goal at that point and Stanford responded by pumping the lead up to 56-38 after Andy Poppink's turnaround jumper with 10:20 remaining.

The Bears hung tough to the end, with Anwar McQueen drilling four 3-pointers and Monty Buckley hitting one with 1:16 to go to cut the lead to 74-68. But Stanford outscored Cal 9-2 in the final minute, hitting seven of nine free throws.

Buckley, McQueen and Jelani Gardner all had 15 points to lead Cal. Buckley and Tremaine Fowlkes added 11 rebounds each.

Washington is led offensively by junior guard Bryant Boston and his 15.7 scoring average. Boston is the only Husky to start all 18 games and has hit doublefigures in 10 straight games.

The Huskies have come on after challenging Oregon in Seattle in the first encounter between the two teams this season — a 92-83 Ducks' win that wasn't secure until the closing minute. Washington lost by a point at Washington State, in overtime at Arizona State and took UCLA to the wire before finally succumbing, 74-66, in Seattle.

Ironically, Washington's opponent after each of the two league victories posted so far has been Oregon. The Ducks (14-5, 6-4) will once again be looking to put a halt to their Northwest rival's winning ways.

"I think we can win if we play good," Green said. "We've played really well our last two games since the Cal game. Our percentage of scoring from the floor is a lot better, and I'm anxious to see what we're going to do.

"I think we know now what it takes to win at this level and it's just a matter of going out and doing it again."

Oregon has won the last four games against Washington, the Ducks' longest winning streak over the Huskies since a fivegame streak in 1941.

Washington try to halt its 11game road-loss skid, including all eight games this season away from Seattle, in McArthur Court at 7:05 tonight. The Huskies boast a 64-59 edge on games played in Eugene and a 163-90 series advantage overall.



"I think the reason this is a big weekend for us is that we have got to find some way to get a minimum of three — hopefully four victories in the remaining seven Pac-10 games to be legitimately considered for either of the tournaments," Eastman said.

Being in his first year at Washington State and never having coached in the Pac-10 before, however, Eastman has never coached at Mac Court.

"I understand it is one of the nicest places on the visiting coaches in the conference," Eastman said sarcastically, before getting serious. "I think a lot of teams have had, and will have, a tough time there this year. I understand it is a very difficult place to play because the place kind of looks like it is coming down on you."

And the fact that the Ducks are playing tough basketball, Eastman said, only adds to the effect that Mac Court has on opponents.
