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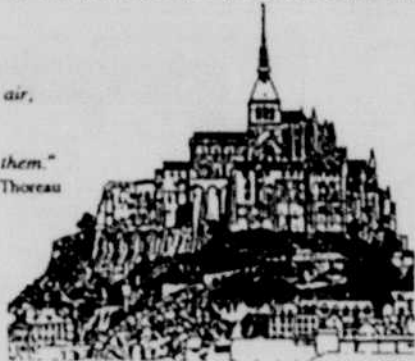

There was a Double-A pitcher who promised not to play with replacements, a journeyman 32-year-old pitcher who didn't know if he was a replacement player, a 29-year-old satellite dish salesman who hasn't played baseball in three years, a 26-year-old right-hander who last pitched in Taiwan in 1993 and a bullpen catcher for the Blue Jays who is apparently looking for one more shot at the big time.

Emotions ranged from distrust to bewilderment to opportunism to helplessness.

Among the minor-leaguers:

— Mike deJean, 24, pitched in the Single-A and Double-A levels of the Yankees' system last season. He vowed not to play in games with replacement players. "It's not going to be major league baseball," he said. "I'm just here to work out."

— Mark Carper, 28, who pitched at Triple-A Columbus last season, has not decided yet if he'll be a strikebreaker. "I haven't made that decision yet," he said. "I'm weighing trying to support my family versus going against the union. It's probably

the toughest decision of my life."

Among the replacement players:

— Nelson Perpetu, 22, plays for a semi-pro team in Brooklyn and was contacted by the Yankees on Monday. He played for the Tigers' rookie league team in 1992. His semi-pro team has toured the Dominican Republic and Costa Rica. "I once threw a no-hitter against the Dominican Air Force," he said.

— Juan Velasquez, 29, is a catcher who hasn't played for three years. He now sells satellite dishes and has taken a leave of absence from his job. He said he agreed to be a replacement player to make money to support his three children.

Then there were the players who weren't sure if they were replacements or not.

— Mike Pitz, 29, spent time in the Dodgers' and Mariners' systems before playing in Taiwan in 1993 for the Wei-Chien Dragons. "The field conditions were horrible, the fans were great, the food was pretty exotic," he said.

— Daryl Smith, 33, pitched in Mexico in 1993 before joining Baltimore's Double-A team in September. "I want to make the Triple-A team, not a replacement team," he said.

"I talked directly to him," Tomjanovich said. "I don't know what he's going through. If he was here, I would know."

Tomjanovich refused to speculate on whether Maxwell was disgruntled about Drexler's arrival, which could mean less playing time.

Bob Weinbauer, Houston's vice president for basketball operations, also refused to speculate on why Maxwell was staying away.

"He's a part of this team," Weinbauer said. "He should be at practice, and we will talk to him. We'll deal with it internally."

Tomjanovich said he didn't expect the trade to produce drastic improvement in his club immediately, especially with forward Robert Horry on the injured list with an ailing back and Maxwell just three games into his 10-game penalty.

"We're not going to get magic results in a week," he said. "Human beings take time to adjust to one another."

He said he planned to try different combinations with his new roster, which now has a surplus of guards and a shortage at forward.

The logjam comes at the No. 2 guard spot, where Drexler, Maxwell and Mario Elie all play. He said

he looks at it as added flexibility.

He could use Drexler at small forward when Maxwell returns, or Drexler could team in a smaller, speedier three-guard lineup with Maxwell, Sam Cassell, Horry and Olajuwon.

Drexler said he was willing to play wherever needed.

"I'm coming in as a guy just trying to fit in," he said. "Our job as a unit is to play together and try to win some games."

At forward, the Rockets will turn to Pete Chilcutt, who scored 13 points and had 11 rebounds starting in Thorpe's place during Tuesday's blowout victory over the Los Angeles Clippers.

The Rockets also aren't ruling out another deal before the Feb. 23 trading deadline while angling to repeat as NBA champions.

Drexler joins a Houston team in third place in the Midwest Division, four games behind Utah. They have the fifth-best record in the Western Conference at 30-17.

"There's still a little time left," Weinbauer said. "We'll continue to explore all options just like we've done in the past. If something shows up that seems to be in the best interest for us, then that's what we'll consider."
