Photo exhibit details relocation

One of the least recognized civil rights violations in U.S. history is the focus of an exhibit this week at the Multicultural Center in the EMU.

The exhibit, titled "A Day of Remembrance," tells the story of the relocation of Japanese-Americans during World War II. On Feb. 19, 1942, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed into law Executive Order 9066, which authorized relocating or interning Americans of Japanese ancestry.

Photographs and a time line tell the story of more than 120,000 Japanese-Americans before, during and after the internment. Jan Harada, co-director of the Asian/Pacific-American Student Union, said the exhibit tells what American history books have neglected.

"All history covers is the American slavery issue and the Jewish Holocaust," Harada said. "There are only one or two paragraphs devoted to the internment. This exhibit is meant to educate on what happened during that time."

Harada, who is a Japanese-American, said the Day of Remembrance is important to her because she had an aunt and uncle who were interned.

"Many Japanese-Americans who don't remember what happened to their ancestors say that the internment should not be remembered," Harada said. "This is not something that happened two or three hundred years ago. This is 20th century stuff."

The exhibit will be on display until Feb. 24. It is co-sponsored by the Multicultural Center and APASU.
