Debate stops after senator leaves

Sen. Joey Lyons made a dramatic exit from the Student Senate meeting last night, cutting the size of the student government body below that needed for quorum and blocking the ability of the senate to vote.

At the time the senate was debating a proposed measure to amend the ASUO Constitution and give the senate line-item veto power over the Programs Finance Committee, which recommends a total budget allocation for all student groups to the senate.

The proposed measure, if passed by the Senate, will move to the Constitution Court and then to the ballot for a student vote during the spring term elections.

Lyons, a PFC member who also serves on the student senate, motioned at the beginning of the debate to postpone discussion of the measure until the

next Student Senate meeting. He said he wanted to allow the PFC the opportunity to talk about the proposed measure and also wanted senators to consider the measure and vote with a bigger, more representative number of senators.

Lyons' motion failed by a vote of his fellow senators. After some debate, Lyons said, "I just don't think this a good idea at all." He left, saying he refused to vote on the measure.

As the constitution currently reads, it is the responsibility of the PFC to hear the budget requests of all ASUO funded student programs and recommend to the Student Senate a total allocation for all student groups. Sen. Martin Fisher said once the recommendation is presented to the senate, the senate can either approve the recommendation or send it back to the PFC with proposed changes.

Fisher said the system, put in place this year by a vote of the student body last spring, could

create a shuffle between the PFC and the senate. He said the PFC can vote not to make a change suggested by the senate and the senate can refuse to pass the total budget until a change is made. Thus, nothing gets passed and all the student groups suffer.

With the proposed measure, he said, "The problem item can be hammered out and nobody suffers."

Sen. Justin Good agreed. He said it would be a nightmare to have such bickering between the PFC and the senate. "The whole thing is a mess if a budget doesn't come out of this in the end," he said.

Sen. Sarah Keech, also a member of the PFC, said the measure would take away the power of PFC, an elected body of students with the responsibility of setting budget allocations.

The proposed measure should be debated again at the senate meeting next Tuesday.

Convicted Eugene woman may get new trial

ROSEBURG (AP) — Expressing misgivings over a Eugene woman's conviction for murder in the case of a man who died when he fell out of her van, a judge said he will decide this week whether to grant a new trial.

Sheriea Lee Bryan was convicted in January of murder, kidnapping, manslaughter and failure to perform the duties of a driver in the death of Kurt Bratlie.

Bratlie died Aug. 20 after

falling from Bryan's van as she drove onto Interstate 5 north of Roseburg. Prosecutor Pat Champion argued Bryan wanted Bratlie to jump from the van because she held him responsible for a drug raid on her home in Eugene.

Though the jurors were unanimous in convicting Bryan of murder, one had decided against finding her guilty of kidnapping.

Defense lawyer Bob McCrea said each juror had to find Bryan guilty of kidnapping before they

could convict her of murder. He asked the judge to question the juror.

Judge Robert Millikan said the verdict was inconsistent and he would decide this week whether to grant a new trial solely on the murder charge. Millikan said he might be able to make his decision without talking to the juror.

Champion argued defense attorneys should have raised any objections to the verdict immediately after the jury rendered it.
