"Today the emphasis was on team unity, and I think we weren't just running for ourselves at the end. We were running for each other as well," Keska said. "I think that brought more out of us and I think made for a more impressive finish."

The Ducks showed their ability to cover events as they lost

only four events the entire afternoon. The Ducks dropped only two running events, the 800-meter run and the 4x400 relay, and barely dropped the hammer, as Washington senior Sam Fu's throw of 58.48 feet edged out senior Dan Zorich, who is still competing despite tearing an anterior crucial ligament five weeks ago. Washington also edged the Ducks out of the discus, as Chad Yenchiesky beat out junior Scott Nielsen by just over a foot.

"We didn't lose too many events," Dellinger said. "It's a pretty well-rounded team when you look at all the events. We

Junior Ray Livingston won the pole vault competition with a mark of 17-3/4, while running the 110 high hurdles in 14.83 seconds, and recording a long jump of 23-07.5, good for second and third place, respectively.

Dusty Carlson blew away the competition in the shot put with a throw of 58-09.5, more than six feet farther than Washington's Yenchiesky, while junior Jim Lile and sophomores Todd Van Hee and Jared Vigna combined for an Oregon sweep in the javelin competition.

Also finishing in second place for Oregon was Kelsey Stellick in the javelin, Andrea Tyndall in the high jump, Jamila Godfrey in the 100 meters and Sara Fox in the 100-meter hurdles.

Tonia Brewer strained for a personal record in the shot put at 44-06.75, while Oregon's Valerie Sweitzer and Christine Cvitanich also posted personal records in that event.

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While the Ducks' hitting improved over the weekend, junior pitcher Kim Kampfer (7-10) showed no letdown in her excellence during her 15th and 16th starting appearances of the season. Kampfer pitched 13 of the 14 innings played, allowing no runs on 10 hits.

"She earns these wins," Brown said. "If we would have played better together early on and hit the way we can hit, we

would have won many more games for Kim. She always has been the workhorse for us."

Besides the great performances by LeRoy and Kampfer, the highlight of the day came in the fourth inning of the first game. Already ahead after scoring two runs earlier in the inning, Brown decided to pull a wild card from up her sleeve. With junior shortstop Kathy Stahl at third base and sophomore left fielder Melissa Lemke at first, Brown decided to give the signal for a double steal with

two outs. The play was a success, as Stanford's second baseman, Amanda Renteria bobbled the throw from catcher Lynn Anderson.

"I just wanted to make something happen," said Brown, "and with the players we had on [base] it was perfect."

On Saturday, the Ducks dropped the opening half of their twin bill with Arizona State 4-2. However, in the late game, Oregon exploded for nine runs in a 9-2 romp of the Sun Devils.
