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Woman stabs children at mall

NORTH CHARLESTON, S.C. (AP) — A woman apparently stabbed two children with a pair of scissors at a mall Saturday while they were waiting to see the Easter Bunny, police said.

Ui-Sun Hudson was accused of stabbing 16-month-old Nikki Derbyshire in the eye and her 3-year-old brother, Dane, in the cheek, Lt. Stephen Whisenant said. She also was accused of attempting to stab a 7-year-old boy unrelated to the Derbyshires, he said.

Customers at the mall subdued the woman and held her down until security came, Whisenant said.

"There's no indication that she knew (the children) or is related to them in any way," he said.

Nikki was in fair condition at a hospital. Dane was treated and released. The third child received minor scratches.

Hudson was charged with three counts of assault with intent to kill, Whisenant said. She was being held in the Charleston County jail.

One witness said the woman had been hanging around the Easter Bunny area for two days, watching children as they sat on the bunny's lap and had their pictures taken.

of University Housing. "There is no reason to think it will happen because if the city did err in granting the permit, it applies to all buildings on the site.

"This is just a public relations ploy because they know it's their own actions that have stopped plans in the first place," Eyster said.

University President Dave Frohnmayer, who announced last fall that the most productive and long-term action for Amazon Housing would be to demolish and rebuild the complex, agreed with Eyster that the permit covers all the buildings and that sudden exceptions cannot be made.

"They've played overkill once

too much," Frohnmayer said. "The permit covers everything and I don't think it can be reversed. If it's flawed, it's flawed for all the buildings."

Frohnmayer called the coalition's motion Friday a "short-sided action" and said that further delays by the coalition could increase the renovation costs at the Amazon site.

"We're boxed in by a tight schedule, and the coalition is endangering the possibility of preserving low-income housing," Frohnmayer said. "It's a disaster waiting to happen."

Wayne Ford, a member of the coalition and co-chairman of the Eugene-Springfield Homeless Action Coalition, said Friday that the coalition does not want to jeopardize losing low-income

housing and hoped that their motion to the board would remove any legal obstacles.

"We feel this is less practical than rehabilitating the buildings on the current site, but it's not worth blocking saving the buildings," Ford said. "Our intent is to allow the units to be rehabbed as low-income housing. It's also our attempt at a compromise."

The state Land Use Board of Appeals is expected to decide this week on whether the stay that is currently halting all demolition at the Amazon site will continue until it hears the coalition's appeal.

It has not been announced when the board will rule on the motion filed Friday by the coalition to remove the four buildings from the appeal.

The psychology department has also taken steps to make it easier for students to graduate within four years. Faculty members have extended office hours so students will have more opportunities to discuss their graduation requirements with their advisers, said department head Steve Keele.

Keele has worked individually with students in danger of missing their graduation dates to devise plans that will allow them to graduate on time, he said.

The University encourages all academic departments to increase their amount of student advising, said Joe Wade, director of Academic Advising and Student Services. He said that new students are given advice about which classes they should take at

freshmen orientation.

All new students meet with an adviser at orientation and those who have declared a major meet with advisers from their department both in a group and individually, Wade said. During the individual meetings, advisers help students work their course requirements into their schedules.

Some students feel the advising they received was not as helpful as it could have been. Freshmen Merritt Gade said the adviser she met with at her freshmen orientation did not help clarify which classes she needed to take.

Gade, who was interested in biology and geology, said the advisor she met with was misinformed about which classes she should take to fulfill her requirements.

"It was very frustrating," she said. "I wasn't told what I really needed."
