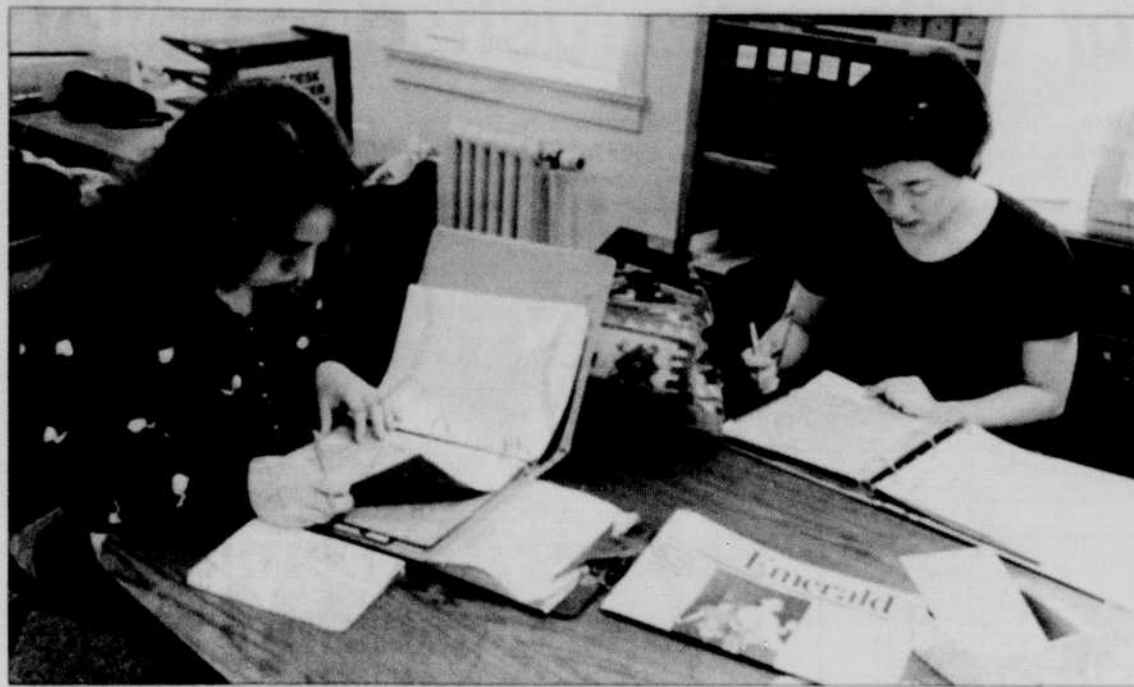

is tightening up," he said. "Some employers are having difficulty finding qualified people. We have some of the fastest growing employment in the state."

Angle said temporary, seasonal work can still be hard to find though.

"Younger people have higher unemployment rates," he said. "This is partly because there are only so many temporary jobs. And there are a large number of people looking for those jobs in certain seasons, such as summer."

Fasold said the Career Center tries to help students get jobs in many ways beside offering openings. The center offers workshops in resume and cover letter writing, developing job search strategies, effective inter-

viewing and internship options.

The center also offers an interview program where companies from around the nation come to the University to interview for full time and summer positions, according to Fasold. More than 100 employers visit the campus each year.

Enterprise Rent-a-Car is just one of many companies that has hired students from the University through the interview program.

Darrel Careen, the city general manager, said the company has had good luck with its interns. "I think this is a great program. The students get an opportunity to experience the business world," he said. "And many move on to become full time employees."

According to Angle, the fastest growing sectors of the labor market are the service and

construction industries.

Fasold said the Career Center receives a lot of retail and service industry jobs, but a range of other jobs are also available. "We get temporary yard work and child care jobs, as well as clerical and management jobs that are more permanent," she said.

Students who are looking for summer work should also check with Eugene's and Lane County's human resource departments, Fasold said.

Judy Alexander, an employment analyst with the City of Eugene Human Resource Office, located at 777 Pearl St., Room 101, said the city often hires students for temporary parks and maintenance jobs.

"Many of the jobs are listed in The Register-Guard," Alexander said. "But students can also drop by the office to pick up listings."

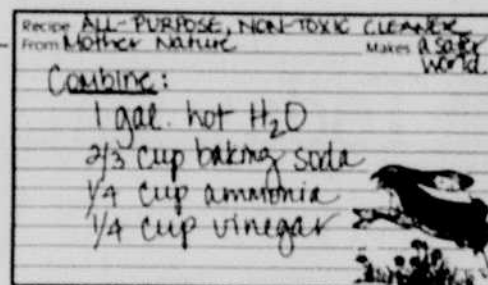

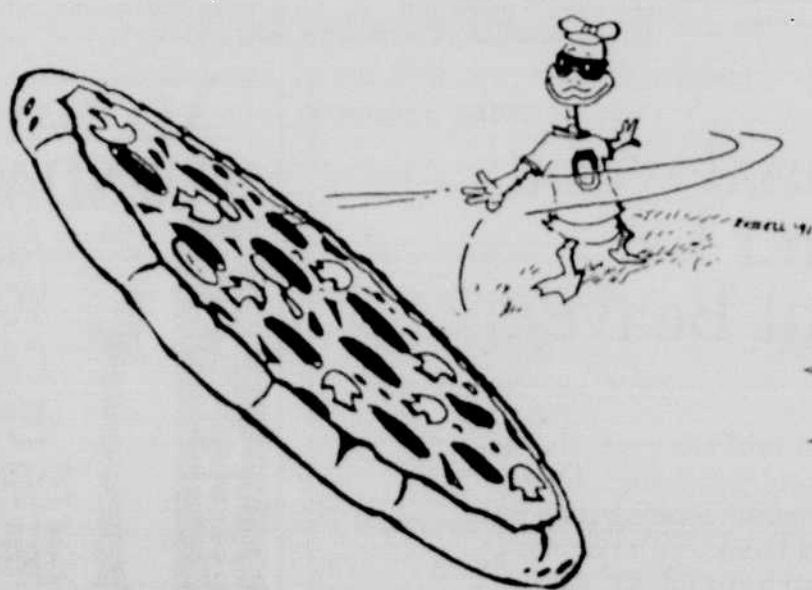
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
