Student lobbies to save Oregon salmon

University student Kalpana Krishnamurthy rallied on Capitol Hill to save Oregon's endangered salmon last weekend during an environmental conference for college students.

Krishnamurthy, the Oregon Student Public Interest Group's state board chairwoman, prepared an exhibit on the dangers of Oregon's declining salmon population and a presentation for any senator or aide willing to listen.

No one from Oregon stopped by, but Krishnamurthy met with one of Sen. Packwood's aides. Krishnamurthy said Packwood has a 50 percent rating on environmental issues, so she geared her presentation toward saving jobs and the economy.

"Saving the salmon is really about saving jobs for Oregonians," she said.

Tourism is a large part of the economy and depends on Oregon's natural beauty and sport fishing, Krishnamurthy said. Three salmon species on the Snake river are on the endangered-species list and Oregon's tourism will suffer as a result, she said.

Krishnamurthy was Oregon's sole representative in the Earth Day Campus Summit, part of the Earth Day 1995 "Free the Planet" campaign.

The campaign's three objectives are to activate grassroots politics, stop corporate "green washing" and pass environmental legislation in Congress, Krishnamurthy said.

April 22 is Earth Day's 25th anniversary, and the campaign lasts through July 4. OSPIRG has been collecting student signatures for the campaign, a so-called "environmental petition to Newt Gingrich."

Lee Novak, OSPIRG's "Free the Planet" coordinator, said the purpose of the petition is "to tell Newt that this election was not a mandate against the environment."

Novak said OSPIRG students have collected 3,000 signatures from University students and hope to have 7,000 by April.

"Earth Day is the perfect vehicle for change," Krishnamurthy said. Earth Day was organized by students in the 1960s as a day when Congress shut down and congressional leaders attended "teach-ins" in their own districts.

She said she would like students to reclaim Earth Day.

"I learned this fight is not going to be won in Washington, D.C.; this fight has to be won by the 13 million students across the country," she said.

She encourages students to support environmental agendas in their communities and to form coalitions that keep pressure on their government representatives.

Campus Green Vote sponsored Krishnamurthy's visit to the Capitol. The national organization strives to increase the student vote and bring environmental debate to the forefront of political campaigns.
