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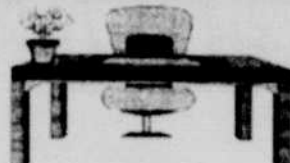
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MSA receives \$5,959 budget

Despite the Muslim Student Association's failure to meet deadlines set by the Programs Finance Committee, the MSA was awarded a \$5,959 budget allocation for the 1995-96 year, a zero-percent increase.

The MSA did not turn in a budget request by the deadline, a mistake usually met with a budget allocation of zero. But the MSA received special consideration because the group was abandoned by its leadership.

"Unfortunately due to a lack of organization on the part of the previous director, this organization was put to sleep," said Dr. M. Reza Behnam, a representative from the Middle East Institute, a think tank.

With new representatives in place, the MSA received support from ASUO President Leslie Warren and the PFC heard the group at its meeting Tuesday night.

PFC representatives discussed the penalties of not submitting a budget by the deadline before they passed the group's goal statement.

"The fact is that we set rules and guidelines for programs to follow to get funded," said Matt

McGinnis, PFC representative. "If we do allocate funds to a program that didn't follow the rules and guidelines, we're cheating everyone else," he said.

McGinnis and Joey Lyons, PFC chairmen, both voted against the budget allocation.

"I'm happy that your group is back together. But I'm a little disappointed that you asked for such a big increase because your group hasn't proven itself on its merits," Lyons said.

MSA's budget request was \$10,402, almost double what it received this year.

MSA representatives said assured the PFC it was now under strong leadership and would be active. They said MSA should not be punished for the

past actions of the group.

"MSA is the only group representing Muslim culture in this town and we are the only Muslim voice in this community," said Ali Keyhan, a University graduate.

"If you do not fund MSA, it's not only bad for us but for the image of the University, as they claim diversity. We deserve to have a voice in this community," he said.

An amendment was attached to the MSA's budget specifying the group must receive verification from the both the PFC Chairman/chairwoman and the ASUO Programs Coordinator before winter and spring term student incidental fee money is dispersed.

EMU scores budget increase

The Student Senate on Tuesday approved a 2.7 percent EMU budget increase for the 1995-96 school year.

The EMU budget increase may be the only one of three main budgets to receive additional funding this year, said Sen. Martin Fisher, ASUO Student Senate president pro-tempore. The EMU's total budget, about \$5.4 million, is partially funded by \$2 million of student fees.

The increase was approved by the senate with 13 of the 16 senators present in favor of the budget. Sen. Justin Good said the "inefficiency" of the EMU should not be rewarded by granting a larger budget for next year.

Good reminded the senate of their commitment to a zero-percent-increase in student fees they had approved shortly after the senate convened this year.

Though several senators voiced their original opposition to the goal, Fisher said if students do not approve ballot measures during the upcoming election that will increase funding and fees, the senate will have actually achieved a decrease in stu-

dent fees.

The three main budgets the senate approves are the EMU budget, the Athletics Department budget and the ASUO Programs budget, Fisher said.

The Athletic Department has chosen not to submit a budget for the 1995-96 year, according to Sen. Brice LaFrance, and will receive the same amount they were allocated last year.

The ASUO Programs is also expected to submit a budget without increases over last year's allotment, making the EMU the only budget with an increase, Fisher said.

The EMU is seeking ways to bring in revenue and decrease reliance on student fees, said Dusty Miller, the Director of EMU and Educational Programs.

"There is a strong willingness to revenue share and cover our own mandated increases," he said.

The senate also approved a special request by the Amazon Co-op Family Center for \$741.58 to fund a VISTA teen project.

The teen project will include field trips and activities for preteen and teenage children of students who live in University housing, such as Amazon, East University and Westmoreland Student Housing.

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
