

Crenshaw ends Love affair at Masters

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Ben Crenshaw, who last Sunday took one last lesson from his teacher Harvey Penick, won the Masters championship exactly a week after Penick died.

Taming the treacherous Augusta National greens with a confident putting stroke bolstered by Penick's reassuring words, Crenshaw shot a final-round 68 to finish at 14-under-par 274, one stroke ahead of Davis Love and three ahead of Greg Norman and Jay Haas.

As his final putt dropped on the last green, Crenshaw bent

over and clasped his head with both hands, overcome with emotion.

"I had a 15th club in the bag today and that was Harvey — Harvey Penick," Crenshaw said. "I don't know how I got through the week, I really don't know," he said. "It was an emotional week. This place charges me up like nothing."

It was a slam-bang finish after the day started with 12 players within four strokes of Crenshaw and third-round co-leader Brian Henninger.

And it all turned, as always, on

the tricky back nine at Augusta.

The crunching blow came at No. 16 when, with Love safely in the clubhouse at 13-under, Crenshaw hit a brilliant 6-iron shot that showed great knowledge of the course, hitting well right of the hole on the par-3 and curling down the slope to within 3 feet.

He knocked it in for the birdie that put him at 14-under and rode that exceptional sequence to a 12-footer for birdie at No. 17. He played No. 18 safely and made a bogey.

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Sosnow leads women's tennis over Portland

Thanks to the great play of freshman Allison Sosnow, the Oregon women's tennis team won all of its matches against the visiting Portland Pilots on Saturday at the Esslinger covered courts to improve its season record to 9-9.

Competing at the No. 1 spot for the first time this season, Sosnow wrapped up the Ducks' victory in a grueling two-set decision over Portland's Nicole Burnham. Sosnow had to come back in the deciding set, being down a break to take the win in a tie-breaker.

Normally playing at the No. 3 or No. 4 spot for the Ducks, Sosnow was pushed to the top to give senior Kara Yoshida, who played at the No. 3 position on Saturday, a break and a for-sure victory.

"We moved her down to get that win," Oregon head coach Wade Judy said of his decision to switch Yoshida and Sosnow. "It was a nice boost of confidence for Kara to get a win down at three."

In the first set of Sosnow's trip at the top, she cruised along like a champion taking the opener 6-2.

"I was extremely nervous at firsthand, but I just took it as another match," Sosnow said. "I figured I

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Ducks enjoy continued success at Stanford

The Oregon men's track and field team chalked up its second scoring meet victory in as many weeks with a 164-point effort on Saturday.

Good for a three-way win over Stanford and Fresno State.

Freshman sprinter Pat Johnson kept his perfect 400-meter dash record in tact by running the race in 46.9 seconds, way ahead of teammate Damien Smith. Junior Jim Lile also continued his streak, winning his fourth straight javelin competition with a throw of 213-3, more than 10 feet farther than teammate Jared Vigna, whose best

throw was 202 feet.

The Ducks owned the sprints, winning all three races and the 4x100-meter relay. In addition to Johnson's win, senior Dino Philyaw ran a 10.3 second 100-meter dash and junior DeWayne Ingram took the 200-meter dash with a time of 22.07 seconds. The three speedsters then teamed up with senior Eric Trice to win the 4x100 relay.

The team also got a boost from its distance runners, as junior Karl Keska ran the 1500-meter race in three minutes, 54.88 seconds, just beating out teammate Ben Andrews. In the steeplechase, senior Tim Dodson beat out Stanford's Bryan Zmijewski with a time of 9:16.32, while junior Scott Nicholas recorded a personal best 1:51.31 800-meter race in his second place finish. And while freshman Matt Davis was beaten by Stanford's J.J.

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Women finish second to Stanford at quadrangular

The Oregon women's track and field team placed second in a four-way meet at Stanford over the weekend.

Stanford utilized its strength in the distance events and was able to use some surprising speed in the 400 meters to overpower Oregon, Fresno State and Idaho.

The Ducks and the Cardinal each captured seven of the 17 events but Stanford's depth led to a sweep of the top two places in the 400, 800 and 1,500 meters to pace the Cardinal to 73 of their 187 points in five events from the 400 meters on up.

Oregon's Jenna Carlson kept Stanford from sweeping every distance event as she continued her comeback by winning the 3,000 in a Pacific-10 Conference meet qualifying time of 9:45.74. Her mark fell just six seconds shy of the NCAA provisional qualifying standard of 9:40.00.

"Jenna ran really well in only her second race of her comeback," Oregon head coach Tom Heinonen said. "She ran to the front from the very start, continued to push the pace throughout the race and never let anyone get close."
