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Carlson finished almost eight seconds ahead of her nearest challenger, Stanford's Sara Renfro, who placed second in 9:53.43.

Melody Fairchild, another Duck continuing her comeback bid, placed third in the 5,000 meters in a time of 17:22.5.

"We had it going early, but we had so many people moved around to alternate events, we never really had much of a chance," Heinonen said. "We can't go to the well every week. We just have to accept that. We were just over-matched."

The team was at less than full strength and was unable to challenge the Cardinal for the team title. Sprinter Camara Jones, who eclipsed the NCAA's automatic qualifying standard in the 400 meters a week ago, wasn't even expected to make the trip after coming down with a bladder infection late in the week.

She felt better after the team left and caught a late flight to San Francisco but was limited to only running a leg on the 4x100-meter relay, as was Jamila Godfrey, who was suf-

fering from the flu.

"With the events Camara was scheduled to run, she wouldn't have made a lot of difference in the outcome anyway," Heinonen said.

In addition to the Ducks' problems, Sara Fox fell while warming up for her race in the 100-meter hurdles. She was able to compete in the event, finishing fifth in a season-best 15.13, but was unable to participate in the 400 hurdles.

The Ducks found some unexpected success in the field events.

Kesley Stellick came up with a winning throw in the javelin of 156-11 before claiming her second win of the afternoon in the high jump (5-3 3/4) in her first attempt in the event in two years. The Ducks also secured third and fourth place in the javelin, with Tonia Brewer (150-5) and Katie Pearmine (149-8) both qualifying for next month's conference championships, while Jennifer Thomas placed second in the high jump.

The women will compete next in the Oregon Invitation at Hayward Field this weekend.

MASTERS

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"I really don't think there was any stopping Ben," Love said. "He was driven. He was charged and obviously he is one of the greatest putters ever."

It was the second Masters title for the 43-year-old Texan, who won in 1984 and also has finished second twice and in the top 10 seven other times, certain proof he is one of the game's best putters. Remarkably, Crenshaw had no three-putt greens in the tournament.

Crenshaw, who went to Austin, Texas, on Wednesday for Penick's funeral, saw the famed 90-year-old teacher Sunday, the day Penick died.

"I had one last lesson with Harvey," said

Crenshaw earlier in the tournament. "He said, 'Can you please get a putter and show me how you're stroking that ball?' And he said, 'Now, I want you to take two good practice strokes and then trust yourself and don't let that club get past your hands in the stroke.'"

No course requires more nerve, touch and confidence with the putter than Augusta National, where the steeply contoured greens are shaved to table-top speed for the Masters.

Crenshaw mastered it brilliantly.

"You have to admire somebody who flies back to Texas to be at Harvey Penick's funeral and to be as pall bearer and then come back here," Norman said. "I think that is the strength of his character."

Nine players were still bunched within three strokes when Crenshaw stuck his approach on No. 9 within gimme birdie distance.

He turned for the back nine and the dangerous turns of Amen Corner alone in the lead. But it quickly became a test of wills between Crenshaw, Love, Norman and Haas.

Love had the lead alone after he squandered a makable eagle try at No. 15 and settled for birdie. He followed that with a three-putt bogey at 16.

Norman lost his chance when he hit a poor sand wedge into No. 17, pulling it well left of the hole and three-putted.

Crenshaw proved again he is one of the best putters in the history of the game. He

made an outstanding 5-foot par putt on No. 12 after blasting from the bunker and followed with a big-breaking 15-foot birdie putt on No. 13.

Crenshaw, who started the day tied for the lead at 10-under with Henninger, first took the lead on No. 2 when he knocked an 80-yard wedge shot to within 2 feet and made a birdie. Henninger, meanwhile, dumped a wedge shot of the same distance into the greenside trap and started his slide with a bogey and shot a 76 to finish at 10-under 278.

David Frost and Steve Elkington were tied at 9-under. Phil Mickelson and Scott Hoch were at 8-under. Curtis Stange finished at 7-under and Fred Couples was at 6-under-par 282.
