BALLOT MEASURES

1. ASUO Student Senate Proposed Ballot Measure

Background: The ASUO Constitution currently requires the Oregon Student Public Interest Research Group (OSPIRG) to receive its allocation of mandatory incidental fees via non-binding referendum every two years, and via the regular fee allocation process in intervening years. No other ASUO student program is required to use the referendum process to receive mandatory incidental fees, however all ASUO student programs may seek funding via the ballot if they so choose.

Proposed Ballot Measure: Shall Article 6, section 16 of the ASUO Constitution be repealed to require OSPIRG to annually undergo the regular mandatory incidental fee allocation process, but still allowing OSPIRG to pursue support via the ballot at any time?

2. ASUO Student Senate Proposed Ballot Measure

QUESTION: Shall the title of the ASUO Student Senate President Pro Tempore (Article 6, section 12 of the ASUO Constitution) be changed to ASUO Student Senate President?

3. ASUO Student Senate Proposed Ballot Measure

Background: Currently, the ASUO Vice President serves as Chair of the Student Senate, presiding over its meeting and voting in case of a tie. The effect of this ballot measure would remove the
