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Board elects Thorn for editor

"We hired who we thought was the most qualified candidate," said Richard Rofsky, chairman of the board. The board, which is comprised of community members, faculty, students and *Emerald* staff, made the announcement Tuesday evening after interviewing the applicants.

"We were pleased with the quality and the experience of all the candidates this year," he said.

Thorn competed against two other *Emerald* staff members. He will begin training for the position this term and will take over as editor for the first issue of summer term.

"I want this to be the best college newspaper in the country," Thorn said. He said this may be an optimistic goal, but one that is attainable.

He said he wants the *Emerald*

to be a more thorough read of Eugene's vibrant, exciting community and the University's dynamic student body. He wants to improve the visual quality of the newspaper by increasing the use of graphics and photos.

Thorn is a senior majoring in print journalism. He has worked at the *Emerald* since the summer before his second year of college. He came to apply for a position as a copy editor or columnist, but was hired for one of the editorial editor positions.

"It's been my home away from home ever since," Thorn said.

Student Senate aids computer fund

The pot of money for student groups to purchase computers for their offices grew last night when the ASUO Student Senate agreed to match and possibly double the funds to purchase computers allocated by the University administration.

The senate unanimously approved a motion to transfer \$10,000 from surplus funds to a senate line-item account to match money made available by the University.

The senate also voted to put \$10,000 more in the fund from a University over-realized account, which includes interest from student fee accounts and revenue generated from over-realized enrollment, or incidental fees that have already been taxed.

Money from the over-realized account will be transferred pending approval from the ASUO president and the University administration.

The deadline is Friday for student groups to apply to the senate Computer Committee for a computer from this fund.

In other business, The *Student Insurgent* will have to appeal its 1995-96 budget yet again after an appeal for more funding was denied by the student senate Tuesday night.

Brady appealed to the Programs Finance Committee after the group's initial appearance in front of the committee in March, and made his first appeal to the senate Tuesday night.

While Brady said the *Insurgent* was not seeking funding equal to that of the biweekly *Commentator*, he said that the amount allocated by the Programs Finance Committee are not sufficient for the paper's publication, and the *Insurgent* will continue to seek more funding.

"We're activists...." Brady said. "Nothing can stop us now."
