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al building receive several bomb threats a year, so they are always conscious of danger. "We're always aware that it could happen here because Eugene has the reputation of being number one in the nation for civil disobedience," Cascio said.

The search is a routine thing, Woodcum said.

"It was just a precaution to make sure nothing was around," he said.

Wednesday morning Laura Bates, a junior History major from Tulsa, Okla., heard on the radio that a bomb exploded in Oklahoma City. She was shocked.

"It's hard to believe that something like that happened in Oklahoma," Bates said.

The situation is devastating, she said. She

talked to her father Wednesday afternoon who said two of his colleagues were working near the building in Oklahoma City but were not injured.

The people in Tulsa and Oklahoma City are coming together in support of the people, Bates said.

The federal building in Portland was evacuated, after officials received a telephone bomb scare alluding to the Oklahoma City bombing, said Bill Dubrey, spokesman for the General Services Agency in Aberdeen, Wash.

Portland police officers and Federal Protection Service officers searched the building but found nothing. The employees were able to return to work, but security was increased as a precaution.

"We take every threat seriously," Dubrey

said. "We're keeping our security high."

The number of security officers was increased as well as the visibility of the officers.

Federal buildings all over the country are experiencing similar threats from people considered to be copy cats of the Oklahoma bombing, Dubrey said.

Federal buildings in Boston, Nebraska, Oregon and Delaware were evacuated today following the explosion in Oklahoma City because of telephoned bomb threats and complaints of office tampering.

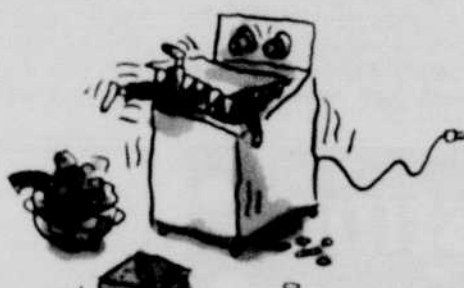
Boston's City Hall, next to the federal building, also was evacuated. Security was tightened at other federal buildings nationwide, the Justice Department and Capitol in Washington and at New York City's police headquarters.

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
