Race: The field of student government candidates tightens

Chris Kantrowitz and Niki Scott emerged as early victors in the race for ASUO Executive as the field was narrowed to two tickets Thursday night.

The two tickets going on to the general election next week are Kantrowitz and Scott who received 929 votes and Jennifer Williamson and Zachary Kelton with 606 votes. Kantrowitz and Scott won the primary elections by more than 300 votes, with 15 percent of University students casting ballots or 2,478 students.

"I'm really excited," Kantrowitz said. "It shows that students are ready for change. This is a mandate for change."

Williamson and Kelton are confident that the race for ASUO Executive is still close and said the week ahead is critical.

"I think we'll do much better in the general elections," Williamson said. "I think we have the strongest campaign."

ASUO Elections Coordinator Jennifer Dzeikan was happy with the voter turnout.

"The amount of candidates really got people out," she said. "People on the elections board worked really hard."

Elections officials counted almost 1,000 more ballots than last year, when 1,644 students voted. This year's vote is not yet final because ballots from the Oregon Institute of Marine Biology have not yet been tallied. Elections coordinators said less than two dozen students attend

Candidate accused of violation

Elections: Joey Lyons' use of an ASUO printer was allegedly inappropriate

It was just a matter of time before the torrent of 83 candidates running for 25 student government offices became ugly.

ASUO Programs Coordinator Jason Grigsby filed a formal complaint Thursday with the Elections Board charging that Student Senate incumbent Joey Lyons violated ASUO rules regarding the use of incidental fees for political campaigns.

Grigsby's complaint alleges that Lyons, the Programs Finance Committee chairman vying for Senate seat 1, used an ASUO Executive printer — paid

House fails to add funds to OSSHE

Education: Blueprint budget creeps closer to higher education cuts

Oregon House Republicans failed to add funds to the starving higher education system Wednesday when they released a blueprint of the 1995-97 statewide budget.

Republican House majority leaders proposed \$596 million for the Oregon State System of Higher Education (OSSHE), down from \$603 million that Governor John Kitzhaber proposes.

"The Governor's budget was already unacceptable," said Randy MacDonald, director of
