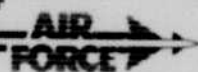

Shuttle service could expand

"Don't drink and drive" is a familiar phrase for most college students. Terence Baxter particularly remembers hearing this admonition.

"My mother was always telling me not to drink and drive," Baxter said. "I thought this would be a good program to join."

Baxter is referring to the Designated Driver Shuttle. After hearing of the shuttle at his fraternity's chapter meeting, Baxter was interested enough to become a driver.

The shuttle picks up University students, faculty and staff from established drinking establishments and delivers them home. The van is available Friday and Saturday night from 9 p.m. to 3 a.m. Saturday marked the second week the Designated Driver Shuttle has been running, and so far local response has been supportive of the shuttle.

The shuttle was an important alternative to a taxi, said Chris Abbott, a bartender at Rennie's Landing.

Tom Glenn, a senior and patron of Taylor's College Side Inn, said he thinks the shuttle is a "good deal," but hopes the shuttle would expand to include Wednesday and Thursday evenings. Glenn said he would use the shuttle if he needed to.

The shuttle could expand to include an education and awareness campaign, ASUO vice presi-

dent Mark Rhinard said. Another night of shuttle service could be added. Rhinard also said he hopes the shuttle would eventually include taking students, faculty and staff to licensed drinking establishments as a way to deter people from taking a car in the first place.

Jen Reed, director of the shuttle, said safety precautions for both drivers and riders have been taken.

"If the drivers feel unsafe in any way they have a signal to take the keys from the car and call the police," Reed said.

The shuttle always has one woman and one man driver in the van at the same time.

"This puts women at ease and acts as a calming effect on men who may want to pick fights with two men drivers," Reed said.

People who want to work for the shuttle must have a license and be assertive. Applicants also are put through a screening process at the Department of Motor Vehicles to ensure drivers have no major infractions.

The shuttle would not be taking riders bar hopping or to parties, and a list of people who abuse the shuttle for those purposes is made, Reed said.

Bill Washburn, co-director of the shuttle, said the shuttle would prove successful "even if we take one person off the street who shouldn't walk or drive home intoxicated."

Environmental video collection started

The Institute for a Sustainable Environment (ISE) recently opened a library of 237 environmental videos.

The ISE, founded in 1993, fosters interdisciplinary applied research in areas of sustainability, said ISE director John Baldwin.

"We view the institute as a community service and research wing of the Environmental Studies Department," Baldwin said.

The video collection, which opened at the end of winter term, covers sustainability issues such as environmental conservation, pollution, population growth and war.

According to Baldwin, the ISE video library is an offshoot of the North American Association

for Environmental Education's international film festival. Baldwin, a former president of NAAEE, along with Lynn Lomax and Karen Froude-Jones, co-chairs of the film festival, decided the ISE would be the repository for the films shown at the annual festival.

The library features a number of foreign language videos, primarily in French and Spanish. The Spanish collection is particularly strong because last year's film festival was in Cancun, Mexico. The library also includes 40-50 children's videos.

One of the stipulations of the library is that the donated films cannot be shown for profit. The films can be checked out by GTFs and faculty for educational purposes. Faculty in the International Studies and Environ-

mental Studies programs are encouraged to visit the library.

Although access is limited to faculty and staff, the library, which is run by volunteers, could be available to more people if it received \$5,000 to help pay administrative costs. A grant was written for the library last year but was turned down, Baldwin said.

"If we opened [the library] up to the entire community, we'd probably be swamped with requests," Baldwin said. "Right now, we're just about where we want to be."

The ISE video library is in 130 Hendricks and is open Monday and Wednesday from 2 to 3 p.m. and Tuesday and Thursday from 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. GTFs and faculty can also reserve a video or get more information about the library by calling 346-0675.
