Budgets adjusted for postage

The ASUO Programs Finance Committee has recalculated the budgets of several ASUO groups to account for a higher postage rate than was originally used in allocating funds.

The correction to postage prices adds \$600 to the ASUO Programs budget, although total allocated funds remain more than \$3,000 under the 0-percent-increase benchmark.

Mailings sent to 200 or more recipients will cost a bulk mailing rate of 8.4 cents a piece through the ASUO Executive office. Mailings sent to fewer recipients may be sent through the office for

ASUO Programs groups at 27.4 cents a piece, PFC Chairman Joey Lyons said.

Groups with affected budgets will be notified, Lyons said, but most groups had money added to their budgets.

The postage correction is one of several changes that will be made to the overall ASUO Programs budget before it is resubmitted to the ASUO Student Senate May 8.

Because the Senate rejected the budget this week, the PFC will hear budget appeals at its Tuesday meeting, including appeals from the Hawaii Club and the International Student Association.

March fights violence against women

Take Back the Night, a women's organization that works to create awareness about violence against women, will sponsor its annual march on Friday at 8:00 p.m.

Participants will meet in front of Prince Lucien Campbell Hall and will march to downtown Eugene, looping back toward campus after the event.

The march symbolizes the commitment to fight violence against women, organizers of the

event said.

The main speaker will be a survivor of date rape and the subject of the HBO docu-drama, *No Visible Bruises*. Katie Koestner speaks to students around the country about her experience and about rape prevention.

Other speakers include: Elaine Walters from Womenspace and Phyllis Barkhurst, director of Sexual Assault Support Services.

Take Back the Night originated in March 1976 at an Interna-

tional Women's Day conference in Brussels. More than 2000 women from 40 nations took to the streets and spoke out against the oppression of women.

The event moved to the United States in 1978 when 5,000 women marched through the streets of San Francisco, shutting down the city's largest pornography strip for one night.

Pre-march activities will begin at 6:00 p.m., and sign-making materials will be available. University student Elisa Alsen will sing and play acoustic guitar.

and lottery dollars is "too high a price to pay," considering Oregon's other needs.

"I am forced to veto this budget not because it's too much for education, but because it's more money than we can afford to cut from other equally deserving Oregonians," Kitzhaber said.

Kitzhaber said the Republicans' budget would raise taxes and cut services crucial to Oregonians.

The veto sends legislators back to the table for more negotiations with the governor. Kitzhaber

vowed to work with the Legislature if the leadership wants to add back money into the education budget, but only on the following conditions:

- Education needs to be broadly defined to include prekindergarten, community colleges and higher education as well as K-12.
- The add-back shouldn't be paid for by cutting services crucial to Oregonians; it shouldn't stall the economy from moving forward and state employees need to be treated fairly.
- The cigarette tax must be used to expand access to health care under the Oregon Health Plan.
