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Harper leads Knicks to second round

CLEVELAND (AP) — Now, the New York Knicks' business gets serious.

The Knicks brushed off the Cleveland Cavaliers 93-80 Thursday night behind 30 points from Derek Harper, winning their first-round series 3-1, then quickly turned their attention to their opponent for Round 2: the Indiana Pacers.

"Just the rivalry over the last two years and how competitive the two teams are will create some sparks," coach Pat Riley said. "We know them pretty well."

The Pacers, coming off a first-round sweep of Atlanta, eagerly await the meeting with the Knicks, who bounced them from the playoffs each of the past two years.

New York won three of four meetings with the Pacers during the regular season this year but needed seven games to oust them from the Eastern Conference finals a year ago.

"Making the extra pass was the key tonight, and I think it's going to be very important in the next

series," Harper said, "because whenever we make those passes, we're a very dangerous team."

The Knicks' guards kept the pressure off their big men by sinking 13 3-pointers, a team playoff record. Harper led the way with seven, one short from Dan Majerle's NBA playoff record of eight, while John Starks sank five and Greg Anthony had one.

When Harper started the third quarter with a 3-pointer that was off target but banked in anyway, he shrugged almost as if to apologize.

"We felt if we went inside, they would just double-team everything, so we wanted to get players free outside and try that," Harper said. "It was there tonight."

Charles Smith scored 17 and Starks had 15 for the Knicks. Patrick Ewing, who has been hampered by a sore hamstring, picked up his fourth foul early in the third quarter and finished with nine points and 13 rebounds.

Bobby Phills scored 20 and

Mark Price 18 for the Cavs, losers of 10 of their last 11 playoff games. They went 0-4 against the Knicks at Gund Arena this year.

"Usually we can clamp down on a team, hold them down when we need to," said Cleveland's John Williams, who was booed several times for missing open jumpers in the second half. "But they made big shots. They played like a championship team. They just kept pounding and pounding."

Harper set the tone less than 2 minutes into the game, sinking a 3-pointer that put the Knicks ahead 6-2. Starks connected on two more later in the quarter, helping them stretch their lead to 27-17 after one.

The Cavs never really got back in it, because New York's razor-sharp long-range shooting deflated them every time they made a run.

— When Chris Mills' 3-pointer pulled the Cavs within six midway through the second quarter, Starks hit a trey on the Knicks' next possession.

— When Phills' 3-pointer brought the Cleveland deficit under double digits late in the half, Harper answered with an 18-footer for a 54-43 halftime lead.

— When Price ran off five quick points to close it to 58-50 early in the third quarter, Harper immediately hit a 3-pointer to restore a double-figure lead.

— Cleveland fell behind by 20 early in the fourth, and when it rallied to get back within 11, Starks hit New York's last 3-pointer.

"When they cut it to 11, I think we scored, and that pretty much closed it out," Riley said. "Derek had a monster of a game. Earlier in the series, he was focusing solely on stopping Mark Price. He did that all series, but tonight he was aggressive on offense."

"Every time we tried to make a run, they'd hit a big shot to quench the fire," Price said.

Harper made 11 of 14 shots, including seven of 10 from beyond the arc. Starks sank five of seven 3-point attempts.

"Every point counts in a scoring meet," Dellinger said, citing the Ducks' narrow 204-200 Pepsi meet victory — which came down to the last three events — as an example.

Freshman sprinter Pat Johnson, who is coming off of a victory over Olympian Carl Lewis at the Drake meet, is scheduled to run four races (the 100-meter dash, the 200-

meter dash, the 4x100 relay and the 4x400 relay) as is junior decathlete Ray Livingston (the long jump, pole vault, high hurdles and high jump). The Ducks will also look to senior Dan Zorich, who is competing in the hammer, discus and shot put, and junior high jumper Chris Nelson, who cleared 7-foot-1 at the Drake meet, to put points on the board, but could be without junior distance runner Karl Keska, who has been fighting a sinus infection and hay fever the last two weeks.

NBA PLAYOFF RESULTS

Amid controversy over a foul that wasn't called just before the end of the game, the Chicago Bulls defeated the Charlotte Hornets 85-84 Thursday night to advance to the second round of the NBA playoffs.

The Hornets' Larry Johnson missed a 20-foot jump shot with the clock winding down, but teammate Hersey Hawkins grabbed it and attempted a layup at the buzzer. The shot didn't fall, no foul was called on the Bulls' Michael Jordan and the Bulls walked away with the 3-1 series win.

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Sparked by a 34-point effort from Nick Van Exel, the Los Angeles Lakers beat the Seattle Supersonics 114-110 on Thursday night.

The Sonics, who were beat in the first round by Denver last year, won the first game of the series in Seattle, but couldn't muster up another win against the Lakers.

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
