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Moeller steps down at Michigan

ANN ARBOR (AP) — Gary Moeller resigned as Michigan football coach today, six days after he was arrested on charges stemming from a drunken outburst.

Moeller will remain on the university payroll while he takes a leave of absence. Athletic director Joe Roberson said Moeller is entitled to a year of leave with his full \$130,000 salary, but it was uncertain if the leave would last that long.

In a statement read by Roberson, Moeller called the drinking incident an embarrassment but denied that he had a problem with alcohol.

"I consider myself a dedicated football coach," Moeller, 54, said in the statement. "I am proud of my career and what I have accomplished in Michigan. I still have my family and dignity."

Roberson said the search for a new coach would begin immediately.

Defensive coordinator Lloyd Carr will remain interim coach, a title he assumed Monday after Moeller was suspended.

Moeller, who compiled a 44-13-3 record in five seasons at Michigan, was arrested Friday on disorderly conduct and assault and battery charges after he was accused of causing a drunken disturbance at a suburban Detroit restaurant and punching a police officer.

He faces a May 12 appearance in Southfield District Court.

Roberson said the incident hurt the reputation of Michigan and its football program.

"It's a devastating kind of a thing," he said. "I'm sure it's part of what Gary considered as he had to make a decision. I don't think the image is tarnished to the point of no return."

Michigan went 8-4 last season, including a Holiday Bowl victory over Colorado State.

According to a police tape, Moeller begged police officers to free him while being examined at a hospital for suspected alcohol poisoning.

"I don't want my kids to see me that way," Moeller said repeatedly on the tape, which Southfield police released Wednesday.

Police taped Moeller at Providence Hospital, where he was taken after his arrest. The Oakland County Jail told officers to take Moeller to the hospital because of his heavy intoxication.

In the tape, Moeller speaks of his love for his children and for his football players.

"No, I don't want any mercy; I don't want that," he told officers. "You aren't going to let me go? I understand why you can't let me go. And I understand. ... Do you know how embarrassing this is? ... I want to keep this ... thing from my kids."

Breeders' Cup Juvenile, clinching the championship for two-year-olds. Timber Country is figured to stalk Serena's Song from off the pace and make a late bid down the stretch in an attempt to pick up the first place portion of the \$500,000 purse of the first leg of the Triple Crown.

The second choice in the morning line odds is the talented Talkin Man, the winner of the Gotham and Wood Memorial at Aqueduct this year. The colt, who will represent the ownership combine of King-

haven Farms, Angus Glen Farm Ltd. and Peter Wall, the last-named acquiring his share last Friday for a rumored figure of \$5 million, is characterized by trainer Roger Attfield as a horse that "doesn't have to be on the lead. In the Wood, he was so much the best that he ended up on the lead."

After the 9-2 choice Afternoon Deelites comes Suave Prospect at 12-1, who could make jockey Julie Krone the first woman to ride a Derby winner into the winner's circle below the Churchill Downs' spires and give trainer Nick Zito his third Derby trophy in five years.

Krone is very high on her mount's chances in the Derby.

"When you get on a horse, and he finishes like this one, it just makes you say 'Wow, I want to ride this horse in the Kentucky Derby,'" Krone said after a workout last week.

Nobody can tell which horse is going to stand in the winner's circle with a bed of roses laid across its back on Saturday afternoon, but a sure bet is that whichever horse does cross the finish line first in the most exciting two minutes of all sports will have a very tough time repeating the feat come the Preakness Stakes two weeks later.
