

Softball team faces disappointing day

In the stretch run of its season the Oregon softball team lost three of four games over the weekend, playing host to 12th-ranked California and top-ranked Arizona at Howe Field.

After splitting a doubleheader with the Golden Bears on Saturday, the Ducks failed to pull off a major upset against the Wildcats on Sunday, losing 10-0 and 5-1.

"It was tough again," Oregon starting pitcher Kim Kampfer said of her second doubleheader against Arizona. She lost her first two decisions against the Wildcats on March 18, 17-1 and 14-0.

In the first inning of the opening game on Sunday, the Wildcats showed to the Oregon team and its fans why they're the leading team in the nation and are holding a 18-game winning streak. Arizona batted through the order and scored four runs in the process.

"Once I got out there I froze a little bit and then got behind in my count," Kampfer said.

During the second inning Kampfer settled down, facing only four batters. However, in the third the flood gates opened again.

After allowing two Wildcats to get aboard with only one out, Arizona outfielder Krista Gomez ripped a RBI single to center field. Two batters later, an error by catcher Leanne Brooks accounted for two more runs. Kampfer was forced to make an early exit after only two and two-thirds innings. Petrina Martinez came in for relief.

Although the pitching could have been better for the Ducks — Martinez allowed three runs during her stint — the batting sure was nothing to talk about.

Miller's heroics propel Pacers to improbable win

NEW YORK (AP) — Reggie Miller, with nine seconds of clutch shooting that rivaled his memorable fourth quarter against the New York Knicks a year ago, gave the Indiana Pacers a 107-105 victory in the opener of their play-off series Sunday.

The Pacers were seemingly out of the game when Greg Anthony's two free throws put the Knicks ahead 105-99 with 18 seconds left.

But Miller, who didn't have a fourth-quarter field goal until the final minute, hit a 3-pointer with 16 seconds remaining, then stole the inbound pass and swished another, tying the game.

John Starks missed two free throws at the other end and Patrick Ewing got the rebound and missed a jumper.

Then Miller was fouled on the rebound, and he made two free throws with 7.5 seconds left. Anthony stumbled on New York's final possession, and the clock ran out.

Miller, who scored 25 fourth-quarter points and finished with 39 in Indiana's Game 5 victory at New York in last year's Eastern Conference finals, sprinted to Spike Lee's seat as time expired, taunting the famed film director as

Ducks end regular season with wins over Cougars

PULLMAN, Wash. — With the Pacific 10 Conference track and field championships fast approaching, both the Oregon men's and women's teams beat Washington State Saturday, marking the end of the regular season scoring meets this season.

Senior Dan Zorich and freshman Pat Johnson each won two titles, including events late in the program, allowing the men to hold off Washington State.

For Johnson, it might have seemed like a ho-hum afternoon after his stunning week-after-week accomplishments. But he easily sped away for victories in the 100 and 200-meter dashes by cutting through cross winds that actually were detrimental at times during the afternoon.

Johnson was clocked in 10.46 seconds in taking the 100 from junior teammate LaMont Woods, who returned from regular duty in spring football drills to record a 10.65 second mark. Johnson throttled down at the end of a 20.76 mark in the 200, easily beating runner-up Frank Madu of Washington State, who ran a 21.38 after also taking part in football drills this spring.

The men won nine of 19 events in the four-team competition, but only

consented to scoring against Washington State and Idaho because the team already beat Washington earlier this season. The team posted a 106-95 victory over Washington State and registered a 126-55 triumph over Idaho.

Zorich captured the hammer with a 195-10 effort, then notched his season best of 165-5 to win the discus. Zorich was beaten by Washington State's Jason Baskett in the discus in the Pepsi Team Invitational two weeks ago, but Baskett managed only third overall Saturday with a mark of 158-9.

Sophomore Daniel Das Neves remained unbeaten in the steeplechase and junior Ray Livingston recorded his first-ever 25-foot leap (25-0 1/2) in capturing the long jump. Livingston, who will compete in the Pac-10 Decathlon next weekend in Tucson, Ariz., was also fifth in the hurdles with a mark of 15.08 seconds and third in the pole vault with a 16-4 3/4 best.

The team of senior Dino Philyaw, Johnson, junior DeWayne Ingram and Woods edged Idaho for a 40.27 victory in the 4x100 relay, and fresh-

Snavely honored by Pac-10

Oregon's Ted Snavely was named to the 1995 All-Pac-10 Golf Second Team for his efforts this season.

The senior from Beaverton has paced the Ducks for most of the season and finished 17th in last week's Pac-10 Championships.

Stanford freshman Tiger Woods was named the conference player of the year and Arizona State coach Randy Lein was named the coach of the year.

Woods burst on the collegiate scene this season, winning three tournaments and grabbing seven top-10 finishes.

Lein led the Sun Devils to a decisive Pac-10 title. Lein has won the award as the league's top coach four times, twice at Arizona State and twice at USC.

Boxer Garcia remains in critical condition

LAS VEGAS (AP) — Jimmy Garcia came to the United States for a \$20,000 payday and a chance for a world title. He ended up fighting for his life, in a hospital far from his home.

Garcia remained in critical condition Sunday after surgery for a large blood clot that formed in his brain following his WBC super featherweight title fight with Gabriel Ruelas.

Doctors said the Colombian fighter showed slight improvement after two hours of surgery to drain blood from his brain and stop bleeding in a vein, but that it was too early to speculate on his chances of recovery.
