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cializes in free speech and Constitutional issues, was instrumental in helping the group bring a lawsuit to the University.

"The lawsuit is an attack by a bunch of LA lawyers who are unhappy with the decision students have chosen to make about who and what they want to fund," said Michael Talbott, OSPIRG's chapter chair.

He said OSPIRG had talked to the University administration, which is supportive of the mandatory system of incidental fee allocation.

Fisher, like the other plaintiffs on the lawsuit, believes the question of giving mandatorily collected fees to groups such as OSPIRG needs to be addressed.

"At what point, if any, do individual students' First Amendment rights to not associate with a group overpower the University's right to facilitate funding student groups? There has to be a line drawn somewhere," Fisher said.

"There isn't any forum on the campus for addressing those issues so students have no choice to pursue an answer except off campus," he said.

Tom Schoenborn, a plaintiff on the lawsuit, said he doesn't believe a six- or seven-member Programs Finance Committee should have the authority to allocate students' money.

He advocates an optional student fee in which students could elect to fund groups like OSPIRG when they register at the University. As the editor of the *Oregon Commentator*, he said he would be supportive of also making funding for the *Commentator* optional.

"I think it will bring a closer representation of what students want on their campus rather than throwing money at groups," Schoenborn said.

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dents from the University of Oregon, Oregon State University, Portland State University and the Oregon Graduate Institute.

In addition to the anticipated snowball effect of attracting top researchers and generating new sources of federal funding, students may benefit from the Oregon research center.

"The educational spin-out from SERC will be enormous for students," Upham said. "They will develop contacts with businesses and industries that didn't exist here before."

Graduate student Gerd Kortuem said the two new corporations will help for feedback.

"It's always important for academics to get feedback from the realities," Kortuem said. "Companies can give us feedback to what's relevant and important."

Kortuem and some other graduate students are currently working with a new "wearable computer" which attaches to the head, helping to free up a user's hands. This could be particularly useful to medical workers, an aspect that the University team is researching.

As the Oregon research center's first two industry affiliates, Sierra/Dynamix and Mentor Graphics are corporate partners that pay an annual membership fee in return for a seat on the Industry Affiliates Board.

Twice a year the board meets to review research proposals in software engineering. It then decides which proposals will be funded.

Dynamix, a subsidiary of Sierra On-Line Inc., is one of the leading developers and publishers of interactive entertainment and educational software.

Mentor Graphics researches and provides integrated computer-aided design systems for design, engineering and other applications.

Four different sources fund the Oregon research center: The state of Oregon has committed \$100,000 in lottery funding through the Benton-Lane-Lincoln-Linn Regional Strategies Board for 1994-1995; the Joint Graduate Schools of Engineering has given \$100,000; and a \$250,000 five-year grant from the National Science Foundation is expected to be matched with \$250,000 over five years from the University allocation.
