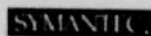

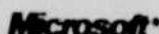

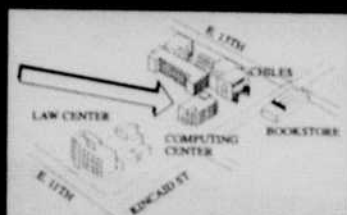

Programs target binge drinkers

With 41 percent of the student population qualifying as "binge drinkers," reducing alcohol consumption has quickly become one of the University's top priorities.

"It's scary to see statistics like this, and the Dean of Students office wants to turn that around," said Jackie Balzer, director of orientation programs. "We're doing our best to show students what binge drinking can lead to and sources that are available to them for seeking help."

Balzer is just one of many people on campus who are working to prevent binge drinking through programs that target students consuming five or more drinks at one sitting within a two-week period.

Officials in the Dean of Students office are currently working to get permanent funding for two innovative proposals aimed at attacking binge drinking. Through grants given to the University by Project Eugene (Century Council Coalition), the office is hoping to have the proposals actively implemented for fall 1995.

The first proposal targets new students arriving in the fall. It is aimed at changing their perceptions regarding the rate of alcohol use on campus, specifically the rates of binge drinking, before the students begin to "drink up" to erroneous perceptions of alcohol use.

"We not only want to reduce binge drinking on campus, but dispel some of the myths that incoming freshmen have about it as well," said Grants Coordinator Linda Devine.

Devine said most of the proposal involves activities that would take place at the beginning of the school year. A misperception component would be implemented in the summer Intro-DUCKtion program for new students, with a one-hour program for new and transfer students offered during New Student Week that emphasizes alternative activities to binge drinking.

The second proposal focuses on secondhand drinking effects in group living environments, particularly University residence halls and greek system chapter houses. Some of the secondhand drinking effects addressed would include campus vandalism, violence and aggressive behavior, acquaintance rape, residence hall and chapter house damages and cleaning charges, noise complaints and community disruptions.

"We want to look at the secondhand effects of binge drinking and emphasize that non-drinking students can also suffer from their behavior," Devine said.

The proposal emphasizes the development of group living programs in residence halls and greek chapter houses — reaching approximately 7,000 students. A one-hour program for new greek chapter members during Greek 101, an annual personal development training program for new members, would be implemented with an information campaign highlighting the negative effects of binge drinking in group living environments.

In addition to these two proposals, University officials are

continuing with a number of other programs and efforts aimed at reducing binge drinking.

The Division of Student Affairs and the Office of the Dean of Students are continuing to monitor the University's compliance with the 1989 Amendments to the Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act. In compliance with the law, a four-page insert describing the University's policies regarding alcohol and other drugs was published in the Schedule of Classes as part of the fall, winter, spring and summer editions.

A change in the policy regarding kegs at Autzen Stadium in 1992 remains in effect, prohibiting kegs unless sold to an Oregon Liquor Control Commission license holder, with the requirement that the beer be dispensed only by certified servers. As a result of the change, fewer kegs continue to be consumed at home games.

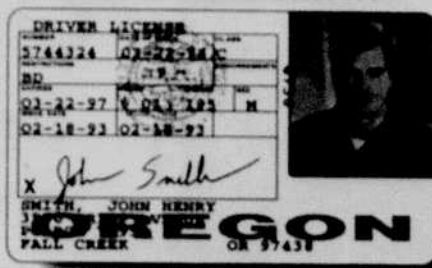
Members of the fraternity and sorority system are also working to educate students about alcohol issues. Greeks Advocating the Mature Management of Alcohol received a \$6,000 grant from Project Eugene to implement prevention activities such as working with local restaurants on designated driver programs, investigating non-alcohol theme party kit purchases for chapters and sponsoring house programs on "creative dating" (dating without alcohol).

The Ballroom Dance Club has also joined in the University's efforts by offering alcohol-free dances every Friday night during spring term as an alternative to binge drinking, with almost 300 students attending each week.

"When you have that many students showing up at ballroom dances who aren't out drinking, it's a real positive step in the direction of reducing binge drinking," Devine said. "We're hopeful that we'll see these same positive effects continue in other areas as well."
