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Golfers eighth after first day

The Oregon women's golf team drove into eighth place of the NCAA West Regional Golf Championships on Thursday after carding a 301 in the first round of competition.

The Ducks are only four strokes out of fourth place in the 20-team field thanks to Shannon Hare's even-par round of 72 and three others finishing at 76.

San Jose State took a three-stroke lead over Arizona State at the Randolph North Golf Course in Tucson, Ariz., in the talent-laden regional.

The Spartans, defending West Regional Champions, are one-under par at 287 while the Sun Dev-

ils, two-time defending NCAA Champions, managed to shoot a two-over par 290. Texas is in third with a 296.

Wendy Ward of Arizona State shot three-under par to own a one stroke lead over Nebraska's Heidi Wall in the individual competition.

Leigh Casey, Susie Roh and Christel Tomori helped keep the Ducks in contention by posting 76s while Karly Mills was only one shot off the pace at 77.

Play continues with 18 holes Friday and Saturday, with the top 11 teams advancing to the NCAA Championships at Wilmington, N.C., on May 24-27.

Crew teams head to regionals

In accordance with their phenomenal season in the water, the Oregon men's and women's crew teams will compete at the Northwest Regionals this weekend in Vancouver, Wash.

The experienced Oregon team was one of only 15 schools from the United States and Canada that qualified to compete in this year's event.

The undefeated women's novice eight squad will headline

the teams competing for Oregon at regionals, following their gold-medal performance last weekend in Seattle.

Oregon will also send its men's and women's varsity four and novice lightweight four teams into competition.

A dream matchup could occur for Oregon in the men's lightweight four division as the Ducks, ranked No. 2 in the region, could line up against the top-ranked Humboldt State team in the finals.

In the varsity competitions, only highly-touted Washington poses much of a threat to beat Oregon.

"Washington has been virtually unbeatable this season in the water," Oregon men's team coach Phil Bussie said. "It looks like there's a chance that they may be beaten this weekend. We're very confident going in."

Next weekend the Oregon crew teams will travel to Sacramento, Calif., for the Pacific Coast Championships.
