

Yoshida picks up second Oregon tennis MVP

The Oregon women's tennis team named senior Kara Yoshida as the team's Most Valuable Player for the second time in her career, Oregon head coach Wade Judy announced Wednesday.

Yoshida, a native of Waimea, Hawaii, is a three-time Pac-10 Northern Division All-Conference selection and is fourth on Oregon's career victory list with 58. She is also tied for records for most matches in a season and for most career matches. Yoshida played at Oregon's No. 1 position during the season

and captured fifth place at the Rolex Regional Championships last fall.

Ashley Fuller, a freshman from Edina, Minn., received the Most Inspirational Player award. Fuller was 11-17 in singles competition and combined with Yoshida for a 10-1 doubles record.

Sophomore Rachel Owens, a Eugene native, was tabbed as the Most Improved Player. Owens transferred to Oregon this year from Puget Sound. She compiled a 7-14 record, winning her last three matches.

Allison Sosnow, a freshman from Tucson, Ariz., was named the team's Hardest Worker. Sosnow put together a 15-14 record including 10 wins against Division I opponents while playing at the No. 2 and No. 3 positions.

Freshman Caryn Coyle, a Troutdale native, received the Coach's Award. Coyle was 9-8 at the No. 2 position and 12-15 overall.

Oregon completed the season at 12-9 under first-year coach Judy.

Stahl MVP of ball team

Junior shortstop Kathy Stahl was named Most Valuable Player by her Oregon softball teammates Wednesday at the team's annual awards banquet.

The native of San Jose, Calif., was named to the Pacific-10 Conference First Team for the second time after leading the Ducks in nearly every offensive category this year.

Stahl, who was also tabbed the Best Offensive Player by her teammates, hit .399, with 11 home runs and 33 RBI, and led the conference in triples with seven.

Junior pitcher Kim Kamper received the Most Valuable Pitcher Award after starting all but three games after the departure of Barbie McGillivray. Kamper picked up 20 victories, including shutouts over nationally-ranked Hawaii and California.

The Best Defensive Player Award went to two players, senior first baseman Rose Imbriano and junior centerfielder Lisa Preston. Imbriano, last year's top defensive player, led the Ducks with 435 putouts and a .987 fielding percentage. Preston led the outfielders in assists with seven.

Freshman infielder Allison Nihei was tabbed the Most Improved Player.

Maple Leafs push Hawks to limit after 5-4 victory

TORONTO (AP) — Randy Wood scored at 10:00 of overtime as the Toronto Maple Leafs beat the Chicago Blackhawks 5-4 Wednesday night and forced a decisive Game 7 in their first-round Western Conference play-off series.

Wood took a pass from Mats Sundin from behind the goal line and beat Ed Belfour with a quick shot from outside the crease for the game-winner.

Chicago's Brent Sutter had sent the game into overtime when he scored at 15:23 of the third to cap a three-goal rally as the Blackhawks wiped out a 4-1 Toronto lead in the final period.

The teams will play the deciding game Friday night in Chicago.

Chicago had much of the play in the overtime, but Sundin carried the puck into the Blackhawks' zone on one of the infrequent Maple Leafs' thrusts and swept around the Chicago defenders to the back of the Blackhawks' net.

Belfour had gone down to block any shot Sundin might attempt and could not recover. Sundin found Wood in front of the net and the Toronto forward had an open goal to score the winner.

Chicago outshot Toronto 7-3

in overtime and 52-38 overall.

"Game 7, home-ice advantage is gone," Wood said. "It's definitely anybody's game."

It was 4-4 after three periods on goals by Dmitri Mironov, Tie Domi, Mike Ridley and Randy Wood for Toronto and by Dirk Graham, Denis Savard, Joe Murphy and Sutter for Chicago.

"It was a great game for us," Wood said. "We had a letdown in the third period, but we knew what we had to do. That was win this game."

Chicago was down 4-1 early in the third period after Wood scored a power-play goal at the 55-second mark, beating Jeff

Hackett with a wrist shot from the right-wing circle.

Then the Blackhawks rallied.

On a power play, Bernie Nicholls banged a shot off a goal post and Savard was at the side of the crease to jam in the bouncing puck at 2:48.

Murphy poked a rebound past Potvin at 12:49.

Belfour, who had been replaced by Hackett when Toronto grabbed a 3-1 lead in the second period, was sent back in by coach Darryl Sutter.

Brent Sutter tied it 4-4 at 15:23. Potvin stopped a high Savard shot and lost sight of the puck.

was usually in his way. But the Indiana center wasn't on the floor for the play.

"It was the same way I was playing all game," said Ewing, who was 7-for-20 to that point, "only this time I hit the shot."

Then Indiana called time and inbounded to Miller. Under tight defense on the right side, he sent a 30-foot heave off the side of the rim as time expired.

"To tell the truth, I thought it was going down," said Miller, who finished with 23

points but hit just 3-of-11 of his 3-pointers. "All you want is a good look, and I got a good look."

When the buzzer sounded, Ewing ran over to hug his college coach, John Thompson of Georgetown, who was seated courtside at Madison Square Garden.

"I thought we had a chance, even with one minute to go," Pacers coach Larry Brown said. "We did and we just didn't get it done."

Only four teams in NBA history have come back from a 3-1 deficit to win a playoff series, and no team has done it since 1981,

when the Boston Celtics defeated the Philadelphia 76ers.

"We are definitely confident," Knicks guard Derek Harper said. "It's not over till it's over, and we are going to have to throw it all out on the floor come Friday. The pressure is on them."

The Knicks took their first lead since early in the third period on Hubert Davis' 3-pointer with 7:43 to go. The Pacers, who had shot better than 50 percent in the first three quarters, didn't score a field goal for 5:10.

"We played Knicks basketball," Mason said.

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
